THE TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT.

The new permissive Temperatos Act has been adopted in Fredericton, N.B., by a majority of precisely two to one or the popular vote. The very fact that it should have been first tried in the Maritime Provinces is an indication of its superiority over the old Dunkin Act, since the latter could only apply to the two provinces of old Canada. We are satisfied that in many ways beyond this territorial difference will the new Act prove to be a vast improvement upon the one it is superseding, and we fully expect to hear of its intended adoption in

many of those counties where the temperance sentiment is in the ascendant and where perhaps the Dunkin Act has been tried with only partial success. Here and there there may be places where the permissive Act can to adopted and enforced; but nothing beyond "prohibition by spots" is as yet possible in Canada. In the meantime then the great tide of intemperance must be stem med by moral sussion. To the employment of this time-honored means of ress coing the perishing, there can certainly be no objection, and the efforts of all who are eugaged in so laudable an enterprise should constantly command the public sympathy and support.
