New York, Nov. 13.-In an interview with General Butler vesterday, he said "I have always advocated a discriminating duty in favor of American bottoms Our fathers built up the American commerce and it was destroyed not by any act of Congress but by the folly of the sturid people we sent out as Foreign Ministers, each of whom thought he must make a treaty so as to immortalize himself, and so each treaty cut into our navigation laws until they are substantially abrogated. I never had but one opinion upon the surrender of our rights by the Treaty of Washington in the fisheries. Down to the award the whole performance has been a series of eggregious blanders on the part of our people giving way at every point, and bowing to Great Britain, and now we are saddened with an award of \$5,050,000 for catching fish swimming within thirty miles of the coast for twelve years.


