STEWART'S REMAINS.

The Body Found-Thieves Known -Fearful Revelations.

(By Telegraph To Day.) New York, Nov. 15 .- The Times says not only has Stewart's body been found but the perpetrators have been discovered. Evidence has been secured sufficient beyond cavil to send each one of the thieves to the State Prison, and an officer of the law holds every man in his grasp, only waiting the signal to drag them to prison. Those having the custody of the body are an entirely different set of persons from those who actually perpetrated the robbery, and the conspiracy branched out beyond these. There are two 400 classes, including several others. The Ceremonies at Liverpool and the Start.

(By Telegraph To-day.) Liverpool, Nov. 14 -The weather fa fored the departure of the Governor General of Canada from this city. The Marquis and the Princess Louise, with their suite, and accompanied by the Duke of Connaught (Prince Arthur) and Prince Leopold, arrived here from London at the Central Station at six o'clock this morning, and were conveyed in four Corporation carriages to the Adelphi Hotel. Breakfast being over, Corporation carriages conveying the party and suite proce sied via Ranelagh, Church, Lord, and Castle streets to the Town Hall, where they arrived at 10:15. They were received by the Mayor, Mr. Roydon, on he grand staircase, which was tastefully decorated. The party were conducted to the great ball room, where addresses were read by the Recorder on behalf of the Corporation of Liverpool, and by the President of the Chamber of merce on behalf of that The Royal party occupied four chairs of state upon a dais covered with crimson cloth. The Princess wore a travelling dress of black silk, trimmed with fur. Lady MacNamara was attired in black velvet. The Princes wore frock coats, with button-hole bouquets. The room was tilled with councillors, local dignitaries, and a company of distinguished ladies and gentlemen. The High Sheriff and a number of members of Parliament also united with the Corporation. 
