

Land Surveyors. Hamilton firm has adopted a bil respecting the licensing and practice of THE VOTERS' LISTS,-Contrary to the Land Surveyors in the Province of Ondesiring admission as surveyors. Each Surveyor, on payment of \$5 shall be allowed to vote at the election of examiners. The Council may impose fees and prescribe rules for the governance of apprentices, and for their conditional examinations. The Council will also have power to establish a tariff of fees to be taken by Provincial Land Surveyors, and make all necessary rules and regulations for curriculum of studies. The Council may suspend or cancel the certificate of of unprofessional conduct. Provision is further made for the admission as Provincial Land Surveyors of duly licensed by the Dominion or any of tish colony or dependency, or of any foreign state or county. No person who has not been admitted as a Provincial Land admitted as Provincial Land Surveyor, acting as such without having first paid the fees imposed under this Act, shall, on for every such offence of \$100 and costs, which shall be paid to the Council for the uses of the Association.
