In 1837 the conduct of Russia in connection with the Persian siege of Herat excited an uneasy feeling in the minds of the India-English Government, and Burnes was sent by the Governor General as resident to the Amerat's Court at Cabul. Dost Mohammed and the English disagreed upon terms, and the English determined to attempt to re-establish Shah Shuja, who had long been a refugee in British territory. The King of the Punjab pledged his co-operation, but afterwards refused the English permission to cross his territory.

The "Army of the India" numbered 21,000 men, and was sent to the Upper Sind in March, 1839, and advanced under command of Sir John Keane. They met with little opposition, but suffered great hardships. The Kahn of Kandahar fled to Persia, and in April, 1839, the city was occupied, and Shah Shuja and his English allies continued their victorious march, and finally Dost Mohammed and his army being completely vanquished they entered the capital. In July, 1840, they assembled at the city of Herat, and Sir A. Burnes was made a peer, returned to India with a large part of his force, leaving behind, besides the Shah's force, 8,000 men. Sir W.
