While engaged in this way a day or two ago, he was struck down by a train, the wheels of which passed over his head and the whole length of his body. So dreadfully was he crunched and mangled, that the scattered remains could with difficulty be collected and deposited in a small box for the inspection of the coroner's jury which sat upon the case.
