HOUSE OF COMMONS. In the House of Commons,

Mr. Whitebread moved a resolution disapproving of the conduct of the Goveroment in regard to Afghanistan. He said the Government had adopted a new policy against the advice of all experienced officials, concealed it from Parliament, and attempted to carry it out by threats and unworthy means, and that having a cause for complaint against a strong Power, they fixed a quarrel on a weak one, and involved the country in war. Earl Stanhope, Under Secretary for India defended the Government. He repeated in substance the strictures on the policy of the Liberal Government contained in Lord Cranbrook's despatch and said that the present Government did not desire power or annexation, but were bound to provide for the security of

the frontier. Mr. Trevelyan and Mr. Chamberlain attacked the Government, pursuing the usual lines of argument. Mr. Chambers cause it was inconsistent with the forms of the House.

Mr. Forster replied in datail to Earl Stanhope's speech.
