REMEMBERERS.

Mr. Wurtzle, M.P.P., denies the rumor that he refused to accept a portfolio from Mr. Joly, or that the Premier ever broached such a matter to him.

Mr. De Cosmo, M.P., British Columbia, and colleague of Sir John Macdonald, is en route to Ottawa to have matters of dispute between the Dominion and Province adjusted.

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Indian affairs are in a very unsatisfactory state in the United States. It is not contended that the red men are not fairly or justly treated by the Indian Department, and it was suggested that the business should be transferred to the Army.

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The publication of letters sent the business of the late meeting of the St. Patrick's Society in Montreal, has set the teeth of a good many citizens on edge.

A serious attempt to increase the number of grains in the standard dollar is contemplated, several bills to that effect having already been introduced in Congress this week.

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ENGLAND AND INDIA.

Since historical events have been revived by the present military campaign in Afghanistan the lecture last evening by Rev. Dr. Jardine was possessed of special significance.

The officers of the Governor General's Force (Gardes) were to dine at Rideau Hall on Thursday evening. Sir John and Lady Macdonald, Hon. Dr. and Mrs. Tupper, Mr. Justice Strong, Mr. Justice Henry, and other Judges of the Supreme Court, will be guests at Rideau Hall this evening.

The Department of Agriculture has received a cable message from England which states that an Imperial Order in Council has just been passed.

—A blasting accident on contract 15, Canada Pacific Railway, blew up two men. One named Hanley has since died. The other, named Goggan, lies in a critical condition.

—It is expected that the McCarthy murder trial will be finished next week. Evidence for the defence is now being heard, but nothing extraordinary has transpired.

—A telegram from the captain of the British troopship Orontes, dated Malta, November 6th, says that there is no truth in the report that a boat's crew from that ship had been sent in attempting to teach a man who had fallen overboard.

—The Memphis Citizens' Relief Committee round up their affairs on Saturday and distributed the balance on \$8,275.33, pro rata among four orphan asylums. The 1,500 Government troops shipped to Memphis during the epidemic will be landed.

—Gen. Grant has been invited by Secretaries Evans and Thompson to be the guests of Admiral Patterson on the flagship Richmond, which sails for New York this month for a voyage to Asia. Grant has accepted the invitation and this will prolong his absence about a year.

—Mile. Dr. Rathschid has been sufficiently distressed to marry the Duke de Guiche, who was only a few years younger than she was. She was under the special care of Roman Catholic priests for some time, and has formally renounced Judaism.

—Margaret Downing kicked to death by her husband. 'I have never seen anything so horrible as I saw this woman after he had made an autopsy on Mrs. Downing. The Downsings lived on the second floor. There was only a little space beside the bed and Mrs. Downing had crunched her husband's neck with her teeth.
