Tha gentleman said that, as yet, he had received no parden from the Minister Justice in the case of Barber. He was still there. As far as Mrs. Davis was concerned, he knew nothing of the rumor respecting her. She is still in the female prison. A short conversation took place between the reporter and the convict Davis, the husband of Mrs. Davis, who said he had not heard anything to the effect that she was to be liberated, but he ought not to be in prison at all, and he would be exceedingly well pleased if the rumor should prove true. We cannot understand how the reports relative to the liberation of these people originated and least of all how they gained such ground in Toronto as to be telegraphed all over the Provine.
