At an emergent meeting last evening the Board of Education found it incumbent upon them to dispense with the engagement of eleven female teachers, who had failed or omitted to qualify for second class certificates, as required by the Department. Being conscious of some little feeling, occasioned by this course of procedure, we deem it necessary to say that The Daily British Whig. it was with very great reluctance that the Trestees made the changes, having deferred it until the personal liability of the Chairman and his colleagues and the urg. ent representations of the Department forced the duty upon them. Nor can those who have been replaced complain, since they were given a whole year to fit themselves for their positions and comply with the regulations, to which exception could not be taken and consistently urged. The law had either to be respected, or the Board had to assume the risk of losing an sunual grant of \$1,200, and encounter the disputer of any ratepayers who might seek to shirk responsibility by taking an undue advantage of legal technicalities. Calmly and fairly the public should consider the causes and effects. One thing is apparent—that no teacher vould have been removed could it have been avoided, and no hardship would have been committed were it possible to avert it. The best has been done under the circumstances. Much regret has been felt in the displacement of two or three advanced teachers, but the feeling will be mitigated by the fact, that they need but little preparation to enable them to meet the legal requirements, and then, most assuredly, openings will be made for them as circumstances will permit.
