Confession by "Castrofrax."  
It will be seen by your telegraphic report  
from St. Johns, published in another

declared himself innocent of the execu-  
tion of Mathewson. To day, after the exco-

with Mr. St. Pierre, whom the prisoner  
had first employed as counsel, in refer-  
ence to this matter. He stated that the  
prisoner had confessed to the crime.  
The confession was made at St. Johns,  
during the progress of the inquest. Cas-  
trofrax had drawn a map, which Mr.  
St. Pierre drew in his possession, de-  
signating the exact spot where the execu-  
tion took place, it being American territory,  
about an acre and a half from Fort Mont-  
gomery. The station prisoner intruded  
the matter into the trial, and was al-  
most certainly a very well educated  
man. He should have been a man of  
some with the end of the handle of the  
oar, the jury being under the impression  
they were made with the feathered pri-  
soner. Mr. St. Pierre stopped Castrofrax  
in the middle of his confession, saying he  
would hear no more of it. It was on  
account of this confession, as well as the  
fact that the prisoner did not pay his ex-  
penses to St. Johns as promised, that  
Mr. St. Pierre dropped the case. Mr.  
St. Pierre believes that Castrofrax made a  
full confession to Mr. Perrault, the vic-
