## OUR EDUCATIONAL STANDARD.

In the course of a recent speech before his constituents at Woodstock the Premier of Ontario declared that "the people have built and are building better schools, they are paying better salaries to their teachers; they are getting better teachers, and they are availing themselves of school appliances of all kinds of an improved description." Such is a correct indication of the rapid progress now be ing made by the people of Ontario in the matter of the general public education. One undoubted cause of this improvement in the quality and the salary of teachers is the elevation of the standard of qualification by the new School Act. Other things being equal the teacher who by diligent study and application, in other words by hard work, has complied with the requirements of the law, is best adapted to the work of the profession, and is most likely to succeed in it. This fact is recognized not only by the educational authorities at whose instance the law was improved, but by the people themselves throughout the country. Certificates of some kind are everywhere exacted, and no School Board having the least respect either for itself or the law dare dream of employing a number of teachers without a shred of legal qualification. Such a thing was never thought of as possible or allowable under the old Act, much less under the new. London, Dec. 12.-In the House Commons last night Mr. Cross, Home secretary, answering an enquiry whether t is true that we are now face to face with such cases of distress as this generation has never known, said, though much distress undoubtedly prevailed among the abouring poor, the description of
