Speech of the Governor General to Public School Pupils.

(By Telegraph To-Day.) Ottawa, Dec. 21 .- The annual Christmas entertainment under the auspices of the Public School Trustees took place at the Opera House last night, and passed off with remarkable success. The prizes were presented by the Governor General. After the presentation His Excellency addressed the audience. He said he had much pleasure in being amongst the pupils to wish them a merry Christmas and a happy New Year. It afforded him the atmost satisfaction to have the opportuuity of saying how much he appreciated and admired the excellent system of education in the great province of Ontario, and to be able to hand to the successful pupils their prizes, and wish them every success in their future career. He then addressed a word of encouragement to the unsuccessful pupils, reminding them that they should keep up their spirits and never say die. He recommended to the attention of his young friends Sir Walter Scott's "Tales of my Grandfather," and the lesson taught Bruce by the spider. He also pointed out how Mr. Gladstone. when a boy, contrary to his expectations. had, through industry, conquered mathematics, how that great ship the "Black Prince" which brought His Royal Highpess the Duke of Edinburgh to Canada was built by Robert Napier, a man who began at the foot of the ladder and worked his way up by being courageous and upright. ### Bayard Taylor.

Bayard Taylor, United States Minister to Germany, whose death at Berlin is reported to-day, was essentially a self-made man, who could claim a reputation in another sphere second not even to that of Elihu Burritt, the 'learned blacksmith. Mr. Taylor was born in Pennsylvania, in 1825. At an early age he was apprenticsition of an editor, shortly after which te became connected with the New York Tribane. In 1844.5 he undertook a pedestrian tour through a portion of Europe, which he described in an interesting book. Then began, too, those extensive wanderings chiefly in the East, which have given him fame over the whole globe, and furnished to the world a library of travel and research of much value. His writings from Syria, Egypt and Palestine are among his best works. Mr. Taylor was also a novelist, poet and translator. POLITICAL. Bismarck's Tobacco Scheme a Failure.

London, Dec. 20. - The German papers announce that the Tobacco Enquiry Commission has rejected the proposal for a monopoly by eight votes against three. It has also declared in favor of a duty, according to weight, on inland tobacco, and such customs duties on foreign tobacco as would about correspond to the proportion between the customs and the excise accepted by the Imperial Taxation Commission of 1873. The decision gives entire satisfaction to the National Liberal party, though the Commission was composed of eight delegates of the Government with three experts. A Berlin correspondent says Bismarck's defeat over this measure has created deep surprise. The rejection of the scheme by the Government Committee does not amount to a Parliamentary defeat, but Bismarck is so accustomed to have his own way it is believed he will not rest content with this initial overthrow of the project.
