The passenger train left Forest City station under good headway, and switch, reared up like a wounded animal. the embankment, with its wheels spinning in the air. The tender followed suit, and both were smashed into.

A SHAPELESS MASS OF RUINS. The forward trucks of the baggage car were torn off, allowing the body of the car to plough up half a dozen ties; and the rear trucks of the second-class coach were treated in a similar manner. The rest of the train remained upon

The only persons injured were the engineer and fireman. The latter had his ight hand scalded; the former was killed. When the engine capsized it caught the unfortunate man among the fragments of tae cap and pinned him to the earth, only his head and shoulders remaining free. The wreek lay in a slanting position, to that the entire contents of the boiler were poured out over his body, scalding the flesh in a frightful manner, and causing almost instant death. Men with axes cut away the wreck as fast as possible, but before the sufferer could be rescued he had breathed his last.


