

The Goderich Salt Wells.

We had recently the pleasure of seeing these famous salt wells. There are some of them situated on one side of the Maitland River and some on the other-about five in all are in working order. They are really wel worth going to Goderich to see, especiall to those who have never seen the Onundago or other salt wells. The brine is pumped up out of the wels, in some instance about 1,000 feet, by means of steam engines, and which it runs into a continuous stream. Reservoirs, which are of wo d and uncovered building in which we more particularly examined, there were one hundred and four kettles.
