Mr. Laurier, at the Somerset picnic, pointed out that the exercise of the power of vetoing provincial legislation by the Ottawa government is destructive of the federal principle, which is the basis of our Canadian confederation, and which can only be maintained by recognizing the complete legislative independence of the provinces. Mr. Laurier talked good common-sense, but others have talked it before, and for the benefit of the people most interested on the subject, the Manitobans, and they have voted confidence in the government of disallowance every time. Not until people vote as they talk will the leaders of party adapt their action to public opinion.

The Hamilton Spectator thinks with the WHIG that exemptions should be legislated against. It says that the system of exemptions from taxation is altogether-wrong, but so long as it is legal the city or town that refuses to grant exemptions, while its neighbors are doing so, is very toolish. The proper way is to legislate the whole system of bonuses and exemptions of every kind and degree out of existence. And it adds: "Perhaps the Whig will be able to induce Mr. Mowat to do his duty in this matter." Perhaps so, and only perhaps. MR. FULLER'S FOLLY.

Following the example of the Chicago Times, the Detroit News has commissioned a members of its staff to visit the leading cities of Canada and ascertain the feeling of the people on commercial union. Several letters have appeared, but the most interesting of them all is that which embodies the substance of an interview with Valancy Fuller, of Hamilton, president of the Ontario Central farmers' institute, and chief advocate of commercial union in this province. Mr. Fuller first discusses matters with which the people are already somewhat familiarized, and then touches upon the annexation of Canada and the United States, in the consummation of which, by the way, the Detroit News appears to be particularly interested. Mr. Fuller was asked:

"Do you think that commercial union would bring about such a cordiality between the countries as to ultimately lead to an-

nexation?" "I believe no such a thing," he replied. "On the contrary my own conviction is that it will have a contrary result. There is no disguising the fact, however, that in this country there are a certain number of the younger men who favor annexation, and that the number is greater than is generally admitted is beyond doubt. There reasons for this are that they believe that there is more chance of progress and advancement in the United States than here, and this is best evidenced by the number of young men that enter the United States. Give the Canadians the United States market and permit them to remain under the laws, form of government and sway of Great Britain, which we all love, and you will give the Canadians the same material benefits which would occur from annexation, and yet allow them to live on under the same circumstances, institutions and habits which they were all brought up under. We are not seeking a severance from Great Britain, nor a change of our institutions or laws or our allegiance, but we are seeking for what we believe will materially benefit us finally as a young, growing country.

The News thinks Mr. Fuller's "pronounced views on the spread of annexation and its coming within ten years unless union is arranged is likely to create a sensation among Canadians." We don't think so. We ques. tion if annexation is thought of any more now than it was at the period at which Mr. Fuller says it was dangerous for men to make mention of it. Over fifteen years ago it was discussed publicly, and through the press, here, and without making any converts. Thirty-eight years ago the conservative leaders advocated it as the only condition upon which American energy and American capital would be brought to bear upon the mining and manufacturing interests of Canada, and without making any appreciable effect upon the sentiments of the people.

Annexation is out of the question, and Mr. Fuller is talking nonsense when he predicts it within ten years unless there is commercial union. The one is not contingent upon the other-the one does not follow the other-and the coupling of them by a man champion; on the contrary it gives the carpers against commercial union a chance to boom the bugaboo annexation, and to some purpose, since it is the special bane of a large majority of our people.

There is a growing sentiment in favour of of better trade relations between the Canadiaus and Americans, but there is no growth in the sentiment entertained by an insignificant few in fayour of political union. Commerce, and increase of it, is desired, not a change in the form of government. This fact. Mr. Fuller cannot too strongly empha-

BULLDOZING MR. M'INTYRE.
