# IT WILL LIKELY CARRY.

VOICING OF PUBLIC OPINION IN THE WARDS OF THE CITY.

Opinions Given Pro and Con-Strong Arguments in Favour of the By-Law for the Purchase of the Water-Works-The Duty of the Citizens Appears to be Perfectly Plann.

The by-law, authorizing the city to purthe water works, if the electors the city vote for it, was discussed in the Grove Inn (Victoria ward) last evening The mayor presided.

Ald. Shannon was the first speaker and gave reasons why the city should own the works. He said that those interested in the water works by law were the citizens at large, including those who are subscribers for water and those who are not. As to the consumers they will look after their own interests, and will, because of the high rates charged them for water, vote for the by law. The non-consumers were those who had to be persuaded to use their franchise in assisting the city to secure the works. Some people object to the by-law because they did not need to take water from the works. What reason had those people to take this stand ! Every elector should be guided in this matter by motives affecting public interests, and any movement that is shown to be for the interest of the municipality or community in which he lives, or which will conduce to the public welfare, should be supported by him, to affect the quality if rain does not soon | ment will affect his pocket. The water works company has asked, for water supplied to the city, \$4,000. If the by-law is not passed this sum will have to be paid, and it means an increase in the taxation of more than a half mill on the doller. The health of the community depends upon having a large and pure supply of water. This will never be had unless the water system is conducted in a way to benefit the people. There are 922 consumers of water in the city, and if the electors can, by passing a by law, reduce the rates to these consumers, they should do so. With the change the insurance rates would be lower, and property would be better purchased. The financial aspect of the question was at length dwelt upon. He reminded his hearers that no estimate had been given of the probable cost of the improvements that would have to be made by the city to the works if it passed the by-law. It appeared that the consumers wanted those who did not take water to assist them in getting cheap water. If a large sum of money were expended in improving the system the freeholders in general would have to bear the expense. A prominent citizen had writen to the speaker to say that because of his (S.) opposition to the water by-law he would withdraw his support from him at the next election. The alderman said he went into the council on the independent ticket, and he refused to be guided in his action on the water works matter, or in any other matter, by any individual citizen, no matter who he might be. He intended, to work hard against

the by-law. Ald. Gildersleeve admitted that some of the water mains were too small, but the pipes could be taken up and replaced by new ones. The old pipes would not be lost; they could be used in other places.

Ald. Snowden-"I would rather support a scheme having for its object the bringing of water from Loughboro lake to the city.' Ald. Gildersleeve-"If this were accomplished the city would be saddled with a debt that it could never pay off."

Mr. Carroll contended that if the city wanted to get a good supply of water a large sum of money would have to be expended. It was said that if the city secured the water works they would derive the same profits from them as the present company. How was this conclusion reached? He had seen in his time a great deal of corporation business, and he did not think any council could run the works to the same advantage as a private company. If the water supply was increased so that the outlying wards would be benefitted a large sum of money would need to be expended, probably three or four hundred thousand

Ald. Gildersleeve-"We know how much money it would take to make the necessary

improvements." Mr. Carroll did not think that a man, who did not want water from the works, should be taxed so that others might be supplied with it at lower rates. The city would have to expend perhaps half a million dollars before the city could be supplied with water properly.

Ald. Gildersleeve thought that the city was just as capable of running the water works as the company. The works, if taken over by the city, would be controlled by a board of commissioners, composed of competent men. There was not the slightest danger of the works being mismanaged; the city would be as economically and as honestly runas they are new. He had been an alderman for many years, and he had not seen or heard of an instance in which an alderman appropriated the city's money or made money out of any investment of the city. If they would compare the management of the city's affairs with those of other cities they would find that the interests of Kingston were looked after better by the aldermen than the interests of any other place. He gave a satisfactory financial statement, detailing how the city could improve the works without increasing the taxation. The system would take care of itself, and the profits could be utilized in paying for and improving it.

Ex-Mayor McKelvey spoke in favor of the city purchasing the works, an I reminded his hearers that the affairs of no city in the dominion were handled more competently and honestly than those of Kingston. He thought that Mr. Carroll's remarks im-


