

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS. KINGSTON, Aug. 10. - The harvest is near-

ly through and the farmers will soon be busy threshing. Then comes a short rest. The hot weather still continues and in consequence farm produce is high-priced. Butter is in good demand, and is quoted at 25c. to 30c, per fb. Fresh butter, that can be called gilt edged, is quickly bought up at 30c. Eggs still bring 15c. per dozen. They are fairly plentiful. There has been no change in the price of vegetables. Potatoes bring 75c. to 90c. per bag. Tomatoes are selling at 80c. to \$1 per bushel. Corn is plentiful at 12c. to 15c. per dozen. Apples bring 80c, to \$1 per bushel; pears, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel, and peaches, \$2.50 per basket. Grapes, bananas, oranges and lemons are selling at the old figures. Water melons and nutmeg lemons bring 25c, to 50c. each.

There is little business done in cattle just now. The price by live weight is from 2c. to 4c. per 1b. The exports of cattle to date from Montreal were 37,137 head, against 34,320 in 1886, 35,344 in 1885 and 28,872 in 1884; this year's exports continuing ahead of all previous years. Exports of sheep, however, show a heavy decrease, being 13,-587 head, against 39,548 in 1886, 24,070 in 1885, and 24,510 in 1884. Owing to larger receipts an easier time prevailed in the cattle market, although the offerings were large demand was good and an active business was done. Prices, however, were 1c. per 1b. lower. At Point St. Charles cattle yards a good number of export cattle changed hands at 31c. to 41c. per fb. live weight. Ocean freights were quoted at 35s. to 40s.

Hides bring 6c, to 8c, per lb.; sheepskins, 40c. to 50c. each; wool, 20c. to 22c. per 1.; deacons, 25c. to 35c., and calfskins, 6c. to Sc. per Ib. Business is very quiet.

The cheese outlook is good. Latest advices from England seem to show that the drought has really been pretty bad, and from information at hand the chances are that Canada will not exceed last year's production. Altogether it looks like a prosperous season for cheese makers for to-day the cable showed 56s. a wonderful advance. The top price in this section will probably be about 12c per Ib.

The market for wheat in Montreal is quiet, and we hear of no sales. Peas are also quiet, buyers' and sellers' views being apart. There are buyers at 66tc. afloat. There is a fair demand for oats in car lots for the country trade, both east and west, their supply having run out and the new not


A Very Dear Bath.


