

NATIONAL LEAGUE.

The British government seems to have made a mistake in the proclaiming of the National league on the ground that it is inciting to acts of violence and intimidation. The league has been devoted laterly to electoral work, and the inference is that the government wants to prevent the continua' tion of that work. Whatever the object of the government it seems to have precipitated confusion and contention among parties, to have deprived itself of the support of influential unionists, and made the dissolution of the house among the early probabilities.

A SWINDLE ALL AROUND.

The Scott-Dunn swindle is one of the features of our times. Scott was teller of a New York bank and premeditated a large steal of its funds. But he thought it well to consult a lawyer as to how he should act. He consulted Dunn, and that gentleman advised him to get away with \$1,000,000 if possible, the greater the sum the better. He was not to make off into Canada with such a sum, however, because he could be extradited, and lose his money and liberty at the same time. Dunn thought a better plan would be to leave the cash with him, and he would send it to the thief as he desired it. Scott didn't get away with \$1,000,000, but he secured \$140,000, and, as advised, left it in Dunn's hands and fled. When at a safe and convenient distance, and when there seemed to be no bar to his recovery of the plunder, he wrote to Dunn about it. The lawyer had thought himself justified in gambling with the money, and cooly informed Scott that he had lost the whole of it in the wheat pit. Then Scott peached and Dunn was arrested. Scott has confessed all. and is on his way to New York to surrender himself to the authorities and take his chances with Dunn of going to Sing Sing. It is not often that a case takes this development, but it is infinitely just and proper that the two men should fare equally in the punishments inflicted. Scott hopes to get off light by giving Dunn away, but a wise and discriminating jury will fail to see why the exposure of one scamp should mitigate the offence of another.

### HENRY GEORGE PLATFORM.

The labour convention which met at Syracuse, and which was controlled by the George party, nominated candidates for all the offices in the next state election, and drafted the platform upon which they will appeal to the people for support.

In this platform it is declared that all taxes shall be imposed on land, exclusive of improvements, thus demanding the abolition of all customs duties and internal taxes, and casting all the burdens of the government, local, state and national, on the farm, the home, and the ground of the factory. The government is to issue all money without the intervention of banks, and it is to control all railroads and to conduct a telegraph System. The success of Henry George, in the last New York mayoralty campaign, may justify this wider test of his influence, but it is somewhat ominous of defeat that at the very time the convention was selecting standard-bearers it was suppressing the socialists and seeking to sink their hopes beyond the possibility of revival. Not that a socialistic success under the circumstances was to be feared, seeing that some of their doctrines were not calculated to command popular support, and that profound sorrow was not unlikely to be felt for the routing the leaders would sustain; but the secession from the labor party of many, who, on a former secession, voted for George, weakens the chances which his favorites will have of victory in the electoral struggle.

The George party is gaining and losing and the gains and losses appear to pretty nearly balance. Many were the converts which the land tax and land scheme are reported to be making, but it is a question if the bulk of these converts are sufficiently enthusiastic to justify the course which Henry George is taking. Belief in the reasonableness of a scheme and the justice of a principle is one thing, and submission to absolute dictation is another. Coercion in connection with any so-called popular movement is disastrous to it, and there has been a touch of coercion in connection with the Syracuse convention.

The various labour unions are not united upon the candidates who will presume to represent them in the state elections. The Henry George party only had to do with their nomination, and they will get only the support of that party. The result will show how numerous the party is and that may be something to contend for.

### NEW IMPOSITIONS.

The combinations into which the cotton manufacturers and sugar refiners have entered, for an advance in the prices of goods, have brought down upon them the most hostile criticism. Granulated sugar is quoted at 63c and 63c per Ib by all grocers within the combination, andito be out of it is to be forced to import sugar and pay a duty of \$2.89 per 100 lbs. Without protection it is held that granulated sugar would sell for about 4c per lb., or less, and the inference is grip on the offices.

that the refiners are "using antiquated methods of refining, or they are making

enormous profits." As for the cotton men, a correspondent of the Montreal Star, evidently a well-posted man, declares that before the recent advance Canadian prices were considerably higher than those of American goods, and this fact should give the farmers of Canada some idea of the amount of premium they are now paying to support the manufacturers, who, not content with large profits, form itself into a combination to control the manufacturers, instead of being controlled by them, and this can be most effectually done by resorting to the plan of boycott against one or two of the largest mills, by refusing to buy a yard of their productions. The farmers should also hold a meeting with the single object of seeking a reduction in the duty.

The Mail, commenting upon the action of the several "combines," says they explode the theory that they cure themselves, and the sugar and cotton manufacturers are shaking the public faith in this legend. When one combination is so strong that it can increase the price of the manufactured article in the face of a reduction in the price of the raw material and when another extends through all the ramifications of trade and includes the boycotting of the corner grocer who sells below a fixed retail rate, it is useless to pretend that combinations cannot become powerful and that they may not be utilized to the undue advantage of the manufacturer and to the great injury of the consumer. The result of the combinations is favourable to the manufacturers at present. But the future must not be lost sight of. To protect native industry is one thing, to tolerate combinations under which a healthy competition at home is forbidden

is another thing. With the views of our contemporary we quite agree. Protection had the endorsement of the people on three occasions, and had come to be regarded as a fixture, so long at least as it was continued by the Americans; that it should be used as a leverage towards indefensible imposition evokes almost universal disapprobation. With the combinations such as we have referred to to the public have no sympathy, and the sooner they cease to be the better for those that are engaged in them.

### A SAD AND FATAL ACCIDENT.

A Man Hurt on the Str. D. D. Calvin-He

Died Soon Afterwards. On Saturday afternoon a fatal accident occurred at Garden Island. W. J. Brooks. one of the crew of the str. D. D. Calvin, while assisting to unload timber from her, received injuries which caused his death. A heavy stick of timber was being hoisted, and not being caught by the middle he undertook to balance it. The grips gave way, and it fell on him, breaking both his hip bones, the right thigh and the left leg. He was sent to the general hospital by a special steamer, but died soon after his arrival at that institution. He was the only support of a widowed mother in Ireland, and was contemplating an early return to his native land. Two sisters died not long since, and after his removal to Canada.

### Mishap in the City.

On Saturday afternoon while the base-ball match was in progress two accidents occured. At the corner of Barrie and Johnson streets a boy named Blake fell from a waggon, was stepped upon by a horse, and injured very seriously. Mr. Devana drove into a vacant lot adjoining the base-ball ground while the game was progressing. His horse became frightened, dashed forward. The shaft struck him in the back and knocked him down. He was cut in the face and bruised on the body. He suffered more from the shock than from the wounds he received.

### MURDERS AND SHOOTINGS.

### The Tale of a Day in a Neighboring Country-Gipsies at Work.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22. - Major C. C. Dawson was killed at Pleasant Hills, Mo., by Charles Tabor. Dawson was taken for a detective. William Byers, of Indiana, Pa., got into an altercation with his father and shot him. John Laws of St. Joseph, Mo., failed to surrender to six deputy sheriffs and was shot to death. Hiram Roeschore didn't know the revolver was loaded and shot Jimmy Wilson at Lebanon, Pa. Both were boys. Austin H. Morais suicided at St. Louis. He was a theatrical performer. William Corcoran, resisting arrest in New York, was shot by Policeman George E. Houser.

On Friday last, in the Chickasaw nation, three persons were fatally wounded. Two families named Harrison and Graham were travelling through Texas. Harrison and Graham became involved in a quarrel about Harrison's daughter, whom young Graham wanted to marry, but the lady's father declined to allow the marriage. Harrison's son, believing his father's life in danger, shot Graham. A young brother of the wounded mad shot young Harrison. the elder Harrison re-appeared he was also shot by Graham. It is thought the three men' will die.

### TWAS A BASELESS REPORT.

Stanley Not Among the Dead - Some of His Late Correspondence.

ZANZIBAR, Aug. 20. -Well informed people here regard as baseless the report that

Stanley has been murdered. LONDON, Aug. 20.-In the letters of Henry M. Stanley, written at Gaybua, near the rapids of the Amroini, June 19th, explorer says the natives evacuated the place upon the arrival of the expedition owing to fright produced by a vigorous blowing of the steamboats' whistles. They returned afterwards, in the evening, in a very amicable disposition, and promised to supply the expedition with provisions. They informed Mr. Stanley that there were other rapids higher up, more difficult of navigation, and that further progress by river

would be impossible. Sir Francis De Winton, president of the Emin Bey relief association, commenting on the letters, says he estimates that by this time Stanley and Emin Bey have met.
