

THE BARLEY TRADE.

KINGSTON, Aug. 22 .- No barley has as yet reached the market. A buyer who has taken pains to investigate says the crop about Kingston is light in weight, of fair color, and only half a yield. Along the lake shore it is fairly good, but as one advances backward the yield becomes less and less. Last week a cargo of 1,500 bushels was sent from Napanee to Oswego. It weighed 46 lbs. to the bushel. The Oswegonians said they wanted no more Cana; dian barley, but the probabilities are they will be glad to get it before the season is

In looking over our exchanges we are pleased to notice the following good yields. It is pleasant reading after hearing the wails of disappointment that have been heard on all sides : Joseph Lally, of the 5th con., Tyendinaga, sowed 25 bushels of barley and reaped 490 bushels. Fred. Pope, near Napance, put in 40 bushels and reaped 512, an average of 25 bushels to the acre. Henry Fairman harvested 625 bushels as the yield of 33 bushels, and W. H. Melburn 560 bushels from 33 bushels, the weight varying from 47 to 50 lbs. per bushel. Arch. Blakely, of Wellington, reaped 900 bushels of barley from 37 sown.

EDWARD KELLY'S, RECORD.

The Great Checker Player Who Was Lately Defeated at Markham.

Mr. E. Kelly was born in Kingston, Out., and is now in his 31st year. He went to Winnipeg about six years ago, a barber by occupation. He commenced playing checkers at an early age, one of his first instructors being Absolom Briggs, of Wolfe Island, veteran, who would play him with ten men and defeat him. The pupil soon, however, excelled the master and it was not long before Mr. Briggs found it hard work to reach the "crown head." The first match Mr. Kelly took part in was with J. Landy, of Belleville, in 1877, for a stake of \$50 a side. He won with a score of 7 to 1. He next defeated D. Millar, of Napanee, winning 8 games out of 12. His next match was with James Dempater, of New York, for \$50 a side. Twenty games were played. The match resulted in a draw, each winning three Mr. Dempster played under the name of Johnstone in this match. Mr. Kelly had the last game won, but feeling too sure made a slip and Mr. Dempster secured a draw. R. B. Shaver, of Ernestown, was the next to suffer defeat by a score of to 1 for \$25 a side. Mr. Kelly then played against J. Macfarlane, of Alma, N. Y., and was defeated by a score of 5 to 3 in a match of 20 games for \$100 a side. this match Mr. Kelly was not aware of the calibre of his opponent who had made very creditable scores with Mr. Yates, the champion of the world until the match was about to commence and he was, therefore, somewhat off his guard. Since going to Winnipeg Mr. Kelly has not played any important matches. He has, however, maintained his reputation of being, without doubt, the best player in the Canadian North-West. In the Winnipeg draught tournament of 1886 he won the silver medal championship by a score of 36 wins, 14 draws, and 4 games lost. Mr. Kelly is not in such good shape as he might be, and not having had sufficient cross board practice. In Winnipeg the players are few, whereas in the east the best players in the Statesare alwaysrubbing the rust off the experts. Mr. Kelly only entered into the Markham contest at the strong solicitation of his friends, who were anxious that Winnipeg should be brought up prominently before the checker world.
