T. & Q. company had a meeting in Kingston the other day on the question and it is expected that the bonus by-law will be submitted soon. No one need be anxious about the finances of Kingston, unless he is in a hurry to have the by-law submitted in Hungerford. I can assure 'Reader' that the one by-law will to a great extent depend on the other, and the road to Kingston will be the main contention.
