AN AWFUL CRIME IN SPAIN.

An Old Spanish Woman Murders her Son For the Money he Owns.

Paris, Aug. 25.—There is something peculiarly shocking in the circumstances attendant on a murder which has just been committed at Orantova, in Spain. Years grated to America. Having made money he returned to his old home, where his aged parents still resided. Remembering their age and infirmities, he was afraid to reveal his identity too abruptly for they had no tidings of him for a long time. He went, therefore, to the old homestead without saying who he was. He recognized his aged father and mother, and shortly after asking their hospitality he confined to his mother his purle, containing a large sum of money, as well as property. The sight of the treasure excited the cupidity of the woman and induced her to plan a most abominable crime, the murder of the traveller. She sought to prevail upon her husband to become her accomplice, and, failing in this determined to murder her guest single-handed. She accomplished her fell design by means of a hatchet, with which she almost severed her victim's head from his body. After she was arrested she learned that she had killed her own child. She displayed neither regret nor remorse, merely observing that he ought to have revealed his identity.

DYNAMITE OUTRAGE.

Damage to a Temperance Man's Property -No one Injured.

Farmersville Reporter. About 12 o'clock on Monday night a loud report, accompanied with a shock like a slight earthquake, awoke our peaceful citizens. Miscreants had attempted to wreck amounting to \$200.75. the residence of an old and respected citizen, Richard Arnold. On visiting the scene of the explosion, we found that a quantity of dynamite had been placed on the sidewalk in front of Mr. Arnold's residence, and then exploded by means of a fuse, which enabled the dynamiters to make good their escape before the detonater was reached. All the glass in the front of the house was shattered, but otherwise no damage was done to the building or contents. The inmates were uninjured. Mr. Arnold has been a life-long temperance man, and with the experience of Orangeville and other places before us, this fact would seem to offer an explanation of the crime committed against him and against society.

The driver of the stage between here and Mallorytown (Hogaboon) states that last evening he brought a package from Mallorytown to McIntosh's Mills, six miles from here, which he was afterwards informed contained dynamite, and it is believed that the cartridge used was taken from this package. Nearly a year ago Arnold and the village constable, George Brown, both received anonymous letters threatening the use of dynamite if they persist in carrying out the law.

More Rioting

OSTEND, Aug. 24.—Rioting was renewed to-day. In endeavoring to quell the disturbance the authorities resorted to the use of artillery, killing two of the rioters and wounding several, four seriously. A proclamation has been issued, forbidding the assembling of crowds.

ENGLAND EXCITED.

ARREST OF W. O'BRIEN FOR HIS INFLAMATORY SPEECHES.

A Great Meeting in Westminster Square-Sir Vernon Harcourt After Mr. Chamberlain-The Erractic Radical Very Severely Criticised - Fridays' Close Call.

An open air meeting was held at Westminister last evening for the purpose of denouncing the government's action in proclaiming the league. The speakers were Messrs. Bigger and Harcourt. Harcourt said it was surprising to see Chamberlain and Collings, favoring coercion, now when Ireland is tranquil, where as they opposed it after the Phoenix Park murder.

Harcourt also quoted Mr. Chamberlain's statements of Saturday and said : "I am glad there is so much old leaven left in him. He ought to have known that to give the tories a Coercion act, with the advice not to use it, would be like putting a tiger in a cage with a man and enjoining the tiger not to eat the man. The government used the unionists as a cats-paw to pass the Coercon bill, and now they treat their advice with contempt and threaten to dissolve parliament and annihilate the party if they withdraw their support from the government." Referring to the secession of T. W. Russell the speaker said the history of the secession for loyal Ulsterites ought to be the frontispiece, with a picture of the faithful Russell, who was trotted out at the Carlton club by Lord Salisbury as the bright star of Ulster, and who was finally closured by Mr. Smith. The unionist party is perishing by the process of political mortification. The government has repudiated their advice, and the country has repudiated their candidates. Referring to Hartington he said he very much regretted to hear that his absorption by the tory party had been arranged for, but he hoped that Hartington would be warned in time by the fate of Goschen.
