Art of Instantaneous Photography.

Instantaneous photography is an art that is very easy to learn. Even the cheapest of instruments will do to take exceedingly good instantaneous pictures. As the Waterbury watch is a marvel of cheapness in its particular line, so there is a Waterbury camera that costs only a few dollars, and yet gives excellent pictures. I saw the other day some photos taken with a camera that is worn under the vest. It looks like an old fashioned warming pan without the handle and the lens takes the place of one of the vest buttons. Pull a string in the vest pocket and you take a picture. Six pictures are taken on one plate. They are round and about an inch and a half in diameter. The beauty of this device is that you can go along the street with your hands in your pockets photographing while the plate holds out. I have never tried one of these concealed cameras, but I should imagine there would be a difficulty in getting any particular person on the plate. Perhaps practice would make it possible to hit the mark every time. In the detective cameras, which are also a recent invention, you can see the picture you are taking on a little glass plate set in the top of the box. Then you run no risk in the matter of marksmanship.—Luke Sharp in Detroit Free Press.

Alarming Sign of the Times. One of the principal causes of discouragement to those interested in industrial training is the unwillingness of young people, and especially of young women, to engage in those pursuits for which such preparation fits them. 
