LAND SPECULATION.

How to Work Up a Boom--The Losses and The Gains Contrasted.

E. J. Hooper has been made town solicitor. He gets \$75 a year, with all disbursements in suits paid back to him, and is allowed to retain all costs from the opposite party in any suit.

The council will enter into a contract with Mr. Northey, of Toronto, to lease thirty hydrants at \$50 each per year.

The mains will be ten inches in diameter and the hydrants 400 feet apart. Mr. Northey guarantees four separate streams, seventy-five feet high, from an inch nozzle on a line with the mains.

Erastus Wiman, in accepting the invitation to speak here on Sept. 7th, on commercial union, writes: "I desire greatly an opportunity to speak to the good people of your locality on a subject in which they have so deep an interest as enlarged relations with the United States, the possibility of which I think is now more promising than for many years past."

BRCKVILLE AND WESTPORT R.R.

Present Position of Affairs--The Contractor has Things Under his Thumb.

Mr. R. G. Hervey, contractor for the B. & W. Railway, is in town, but there are no developments concerning the work. Mr. Hervey is at the head of affairs and intends to finish the road--some time.

While the work has been stopped, the sub-contractors have been obtained against the company, and the whole affair has come to a standstill. We are unable to learn that Mr. Hervey has made any arrangement to raise funds to go on with the work, yet we understand the contract between him and the board of directors is such that they cannot compel him either to go on with the work or give it up.

There would be no difficulty in getting him able to build the road who would be willing to take it off the present contractor's hands, but they cannot get the opportunity. The contractor was offered a fair price for the bonds of the road, which would have supplied ample funds to have finished the grading of the line, but he refused the offer.

The people who have taxed themselves to assist the road, and whose farms have been cut up by it, are obliged to suffer all the inconveniences and enjoy none of the advantages of railway communication.

It is really too bad that something cannot be done. The directors are held responsible by the people who consider themselves wronged and abused.
