



SLAUGHTER OF GROUSE.

Some Wonderfully Big Bags-Men Securing More Than a Thousand Birds.

Some wonderfully big bags have been made this season on the grouse moors. Perthshire, best of Scottish sporting counties with its three hundred shootings, comes as usual to the front, the Moness bag being now a rather plethoric one, the Comte de Paris and his party having killed over twelve hundred brace of birds during the first five days. Other big bags have been made by other sportsmen. Mr. Tennant and party have shot several hundred brace on Dunalastair moor. On Drummour heather Col. Bridgman and the other gentlemen shooting there enjoyed fine sport, four or five hundred brace of birds having been already bagged. It would not be difficult to compile a list of fifty or sixty made in this county each of which will have a thousand birds. Bags of from forty-eight to a hundred and ten brace have been common every day in the adjoining county of Sterling. A Romantic Marriage.




