COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

CHEESE MARKETS.

WATERTOWN, Aug. 30. - Receipts, 53,000; shipments, 33,000; N. Y, cheddars, 11ke to 12c; cable, 57s; market quiet. A falling off in the receipts, as compared with those of the previous week of just 30,000 boxes, and the exports for the week show the shrinkage, 30,000 boxes, while the quotations and condition of the market show no change. Buyers held orders for cheese, but wanted August dates, and with them 11c for Julys, and Ilic to like for August, or 12c to 12½c for the remainder of the season. Salesmen said they would hold over rather than take less than 12%c for the remainder of their season's make, and at 10:30 all left for their homes. The transactions of the day were: 1,018 boxes, at 114c, 114c and 11 c; ruling price, 11 c.

At the corresponding salesday in 1886, there were only 560 cheese sold at 83 to 84c the latter figure being the ruling price. Canton, Aug. 20.-There were 59 factories that registered 5,399 boxes of cheese, and nine creameries that offered 810 tubs of butter. The sales were at 11 11-16c, 112c, 11 13-16c, 11 c and 12c; 224 contract, at llic; 1,104 contract, at 12ic; 120 sage at 12ge, and 44 at 12gc.

GOUVERNEUR, Aug. 30. - No sales of cheese on this board last Saturday. Offers of 111c for 1,748 boxes were made and refused, they asking 124c.

TALK OF A BUYER.

Watertown Times,

Mr. H. S. Miller, of Kingston, a Canadian cheese buyer, called at the board Saturday. He is one of the parties who contracted cheese over there at 121c to 13c, and admits that it was done during the excitement, and thinks they will lose by the operation, but says the factorymen will have their money upon delivery of the cheese as agreed, if there is enough money in the banks of Canada. The stock is guaranteed to be merchartable, and all not up to that standard will be rejected. He says there is threefourths of the cheese under contract in Canada. He says that owing to the increased number of dairymen who merged into the cheese business this season the production at the present time, despite the shrinkage caused by the drouth, is fully equal to the amount produced this time last year.

A DROP IN HAY.

Watertown Times. There has been a fair amount of hay sold \$10 per ton, but the sudden decline in New York of 10 to 15 cents per hundred has curtailed the operations of buyers. Mr. Afleck, a large dealer of New York, was in Watertown last Saturday, He said there were 200 cars of new hay on the side tracks between New York and Albany, and that prices had dropped down to 824 cents in consequence. He said the western part of the state was sending forward more hay than was known in years. The New York Bulletin says supplies are accumulating, and that many lots are received badly heated and unsound, and that such are about worthless.

It is a fine sample of what the Ottawa Citizen, in its ornate denunciatory English, would call "veiled hypocrisy:"

"We thought it right and desirable to allow the members of the press, who are interested in all such matters, to see the book. We shall esteem a notice of the work as a fraternal favour, and with a view of saving you the trouble of writing such notice, beg to suggest the following paragraph,"

And the average editor catches on at The evident claim of public service in the first sentence is very transparent when the next sentence is reached, and the notice suggested measures 47 lines, value \$4.70, a very handsome reward for a phil anthropic gift of 25c.; and yet the majority of publishers do not see that they are giv ing away a valuable part of their living almost every day to such advertisers. This deadbeating is a peculiarity of Toronto. It is encountered in all ranks from an annual fair or a musical conservatory down to a sample of 7c. sugar or a 10c. paper. Did any of our contemporaries ever receive a free notice of any of its business undertakings from a Toronto journal? If it did the notice should be held up as a curiosity.

PAIR OF NONDESCRIPTS.

They Were Found in the Heart of Africa -A Description of Them.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30,-Inc latest arriv als in New York from the heart of the dark continent are He and It. There was a She, and She was the sister of He and It. But She died so soon after arriving in England that She did not even have the pleasure of meeting Mr. Haggard. So "He" and "It" land. But Mr. Herman Reiche, who was in London at the time, bought He and It of the trader who brought them from Africa, and he has just got them to his place of business in this city, where he has a large collecbut nothing in any remote degree so odd as the brothers He and It.

Mr. Reiche spurns the idea that He and It are monkeys or gorillas or anything in the ape line, but insists, although he bought them for cash on English soil, that they are human beings, and he tells a curious story about them which he says he believes.

According to this story, the nondescripts were discovered last winter in the heart of Africa on the Zambesi river, by a German trader, who purchased them of the mother, an African woman. The mother claimed to have been carried away by an immense gorilla, and to have been held captive for several years in the African jungle. She finally made her escape and carried with her the three children, fruit of her enforced union with the gorilla. The trader easily persuaded the mother to part with her strange offspring. As related above, the eldest of the three, named Sue, four years old, died in London. The remaining two are twins, about a year old, and are less than three feet high when they stand erect.

They are of a slaty gray color, covered sparsely with a thin reddish hair, their faces, though being quite bare, with the exception of a sparse growth of Galway HARD AND SOFT WOOD. whiskers on their infantile cheeks. They are pot-bellied like little bushmen. They have tapering fingers, and polished fingernails, short flat thumbs, long arms, and no tails. Their heads are rather Caucasian than African, and the most remarkable feature about them is their large, gentle and intelligent brown eyes. They are of an affectionate disposition, and when taken from their cage they will sit contente lly on Mr. Reiche's knees with their arms about his neck. They wimper and cling to him when he puts them back in their cage, and when he leaves the room they wail and cry after him like two veritable children.

Mr. Reiche has hired a colored woman to nurse the youngsters, and they receive a tender care as though they were able to establish their claim to belong to the human family. But if the children are really human an interesting complication arises under the laws forbidding the importation of human chattels into this country, and Commodore Gerry's Children's society is extremely likely to haul the children into court on habeas corpus to have a lawful guardian appointed for them pending the inquiry into the Africa slave trade.
