ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.

Suggestions from Trustworthy Sources for all Departments.

The denims, both blue and brown, are regarded with much favor at present as susceptible of very artistic effects in furnishing and decorating the house, A very handsome pair of curtains is of brown denim, lined with unbleached canton flannel, finished at top and bottom with wide bands of golden brown plush and with leaves of the plush appliqued on to the body of the curtain with gold thread.

A pretty and inexpensive material for a crungb cloth may be found in blue denim. The denim crumb cloth may be edged around with broad strips of scarlet striped ticking or made up of alternate wide strips of the blue denim and scarlet ticking.

The pine shelves supported with brackets, which are so common in country houses, in lieu of the more expensive mantels, look very neat when covered with blue or brown denim and finished on the front edge with a fringe of some kind. A good characteristic of denim for such purposes is that it neither fades nor soils easily and is not in the least injured by

Recipes from a Western Cuisine. Cream doughnuts: Take two cups of buttermilk or sour milk, one cupful of sour cream, one cupful of sugar, one egg, half a teaspoonful of salt and a teaspoonful of soda. Season slightly with cinnamon and fry in hot lard, but be careful that it does not scorch.

Fried doughnuts without shortening: Beat two eggs and one cup of sugar well together, and one cup of sweet milk and a rounding quart of flour; lastly, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Have the lard hot in which to fry them. They must be mixed as soft as they can be rolled.


Love knots: One egg, one tablespoonful of sugar, one tablespoonful of milk, a pinch of salt, a trifle of nutmeg and flour to knead very hard. Roll quite thin, then cut into strips the size of a pipe stem. Cut the strips long and tie each strip loose in knots. Fry in hot lard and sprinkle well while hot with white sugar. They are good and look pretty on the table.

To Remove Scorch from Linen, The following is often used to take scorch out of clothes: The juice of two lemons, half an ounce of fine white soap, shaved thin, two ounces of fuller's earth and half a pint. of vinegar; boil all together. Lay the scorched article in the sunlight, and when the above mixture is cool spread it over the scorched portion. Let it dry, then wash and boil the article. Of course if the fabric is so badly burned as to injure and break the threads there is no remedy.

Something New in Fruit Preserving. Professor Tyndall has proven that atmospheric germs cannot pass through a layer of cotton, and progressive housewives are now preserving fruit by covering the jar in which it is to be kept with cotton batting. Putrefaction is caused by minute atmospheric germs. These are expelled by cooking, and the cotton batting prevents their return when the

These pieces are six inches long in the middle, five and one-quarter at the sides, and three and three-quarter inches wide below. Every two are red brown, dark olive, dark blue green, and light gray. When the embroidery is finished the colors are arranged in proper order, the edges put a little over each other and joined with sloping stitches. The embroidery is made with filoselle silk divided twice in three shades of wood brown, and gold thread and tinsel thread shining like reddish gold. The middle of the mat is filled up with a rosette worked in long and leaf stitch. A loop fringe three-quarters of an inch wide of wool the colors of the different divisions, and a gimp braid of red brown chenille and gold thread, trims the edge of the mat.

Preserve of Large White Plums.

Large white plums for preserving are skinned by first putting them into a wire. basket and plunging this into boiling water, and then throwing into cold water. To one pound of fruit allow half a pound of sugar. and half a pint of water to three pounds of sugar. Put only a few plums at a time into the sirup: remove them carefully into the jar and fill up with hot sirup.

Old Mahogany Brightened Up. Any reader who has old mahogany furniture that has lost its luster and needs to be brightened up should first wash it clean with warm water and wipe it perfectly dry. Then apply a mixture of sweet oil and beeswax with a soft cloth, taking care not to use too much of the mixture. Lastly polish well with chamois.

Paste for Cleaning Silver

A preparation much used in cleaning silver is a little powdered whiting mixed to a paste with water, to which a few drops of ammonia has been added, or with alcohol. Polish with very soft linen cloths, old flannel or a soft chamois skin. Salt will sometimes remove obstinate stains, such as those on egg

A Cheese Cake.

Cheese cake is a nice dish for either breakfast or supper. Mix a fourth of a pound of grated cheese with half a cupful of milk, a little red pepper, nutmeg, salt and parsley; to this add three beaten eggs. Put into a buttered baking tin and bake ten minutes in a hot oven.

down which waste water passes will prevent the clogging of the pipe with grease, especially if the pipe & flooded every few days with water.

Sundry Suggestions. Ash and other light wood floors are brightened by wiping over with skimmed milk instead of water.

There is no economy in buying cheap, thin tablecloths and napkins. They wear out rapidly with washing. Egg shells will clean vinegar bottles or

cruets as well as shot, and possess the merit of always being on hand in every kitchen. All tins should be washed quickly after using in clear soap suds, scalded and wiped immediately, and they will not need scouring. Frequent scouring, even with whiting, wears

them out.
