

#### THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, Sept. 7. - Butter, unusually dear throughout the past four months in consequence of the severe dry weather, has declined somewhat and is now quoted at 20c to 25c per lb. It is also becoming plentiful and will be packed away for winter use. The quality of butter in this section is very good and is much sought after. Some grocers have complained of the quality of salt used. They say if a finer grade was introduced the butter would be much improved and in fereign markets would command prices equal to any of Canadian

Eggs continue firm in price at 121 to 15c per dozen. They are plentiful with good demand for export. This, consequently, keeps the prices up.

Potatoes are somewhat scarce. They are worth from 90c to \$1 per bag. Cabbages are also not abundant and bring from 75c to \$1 per dozen. Tomatoes are sold at 50c to 75c per bushel. Carrots, beets and turnips command 50c per bushel with onions at \$1 per bushel. Parsnips are worth 5c per.

Apples are selling at 75c to \$1 per bush el. The winter crop is said to be short but the quality will be good. It is too early to quote prices by the barrel. Peaches are coming in quite abundantly and are offered at \$1.25 to \$1.75 per basket. Pears are selling at \$1 to \$2 per bushel and plums at Toc to \$1 per basket. Grapes are in endless variety and quoted at 5c to 15c per lb. Crab upples are a glut on the market at 25c to 50 per bushel. The season for bananas is pasi while the old stock of oranges is done. It will be a month or more before any are received. Lemons are plentiful at 25c to 30c per dozen. Water melons are cheap at 10c to 25c each and nutmeg melons 20c to

Hams are still offering at 121c to 15c per lb, and bacon at 10c to 12½c per lb. Very little trade is, however, being done in the dried meats.

The receipts of cattle at Montreal during the week have been light and show a large decrease compared with the previous week. The demand for export stock was slow. There was an easier feeling in the market, and values dropped &c. per lb., with only a few small lots changing hands at 31c. to 41c. per lb. live weight. Ocean freights have ruled weaker, and were quoted lower at 35s. to 45s. There was a good demand for butchers' cattle. A number of good size sales were made at 2½c. to 3½c. per lb. live weight. There was a good enquiry for sheep. The market has been active and steady, at 3c. to 34c. per lb. live weight. For lambs sales were made freely from \$2 to \$4 each as to

In England prime Canadian steers were going at 11c., good to choice at 10c., poor to medium at 91c., and inferior and bulls at 7c. to 84c. These quotations are calculated

at \$4.80 in the pound. Dealers in the city report that grain is not coming in as fast as it did this time last year. The price paid for grain is: wheat 75c. to 80c.; oats, 32c. to 36c. per bushel; peas, at 55c. and 47 lb., barley calls for 60c. Flour is selling at \$4.25 and \$4.30 per bbl.

Breaking Down the Combine.

J. A. Mathewson & Co., wholesale grocers of Montreal, received per S.S. "Vancouver," 300 barrels of English granulated cane sugar, which, after payment of brokerage, freight, duty, insurance and charges, they are selling at 7c. per pound, being 1c. less than the combine prices. That the sugar is at least equal to Redpath's the following will show: Robert Blackwood & Co., ginger ale and soda water manufacturers, of Notre Dame street, dissolved 75 pounds of each sugar in one gallon of water, and when tested with the saccharometer the Scotch sugar showed a density of 24 degrees as against 23 degrees shown by the Redpath, thus proving that the former had so much more sweetening power than the latter.

#### POLICE COURT-THURSDAY.

The Outcome of a Dispute on Monday-

Fined for Having, a Horse Loose.

Cleaver, drunk, dismissed. James Dennee denied being drunk. He had a badly swoolen eye. The officer arresting him was not on hand, and Dennee was remanded, the magistrate remarking that the gaol surgeon would look after his eye. Dennee said he was beaten in the eye by an unknown person. Owen Tierney, allowing his horse to run at large fined \$10 and costs. Michael Enwright and William Stevenson were fined \$5 and costs each for driving cabs without licenses. Three other cases were reserved, pending the taking out of license by J. G. Hutton, Charles Campion, Robert J. Gowdy and Harry Walker, were charged with acting disorderly on a public street on Monday evening. The defendants pleaded 'not guilty" and the evidence of W. McQuade was taken. The witness appeared in the box with a black shade over his right eye. He said that as he left Elmer's saloon on Princess street on Monday night he met the three young men. "Gowdy struck me first," he said, "and then Campion hit me in the eye. I ran away. Then I came back for my hat, and found it kicked to pieces. Walker ran after me and hit me on the back. Gowdy struck me in the eye, and Campion struck me on .. the side of the mouth." R. J. Gowdey said he did not see McQuade until he and one Wiseman approached Campion. Walker and himself. McQuade and Wiseman were very drunk. McQuade said to Campion, "It is no use for you to bring Walker up to lick me." Walker was half tight, according to the witness, and they, Campion and Gowdy, were tak. ing him home. McQuade was anxious to ty, at fight. He struck at Campion, and as he swung around made a clip at the witness. "Then I struck him in the eye," said Gowdy. Continuing he said, "Walker did nothing. Campion also struck McQuade. Campion and I were perfectly sober." In the cross examination McQuade, after

a statement made by Gowdy, said "How can you stand up and talk like that ?" The magistrate interfered and said that such talk was irrelevant. Officer Timmerman made the statement

that McQuade, when he saw him, was quite able to know what he was doing. He had been drinking. The officer was with him when he charged the parties with assault. They denied it.

Charles Campion gave his testimony. He had met McQuade in Elmer's saloon previously and they had some conversation. Then they met outside and, according to Campion, "After he" struck him he stood back. Then McQuade made a pass a Gowdy and Gowdy struck him. Witness did strike him but did not kick him." Afterwards, when McQuade was about to take action, he was offered, according to Campion's evidence, \$5 each by Gowdy and himself. "Not because we were guilty," said Campion, "but because we did not want to appear at the police court." McQuade wanted \$5 from Walker likewise. The case was adjourned. McQuade said he could prove the assault and Walker said he could clear himself of any participation in it. The case will be heard to-morrow. The chief of police is the complainant in the
