





LETTER TO THE EDITOR.

Commercial Union.

Boston, Sept. 10. - (To the Editor) : In your issue of the 30th August appears over one column of matter on the subject head ing this article, which seems to have been given in the Detroit News. There can be no doubt as to the object of the article, and the trumpet sounds very fine undoubtedly to the ears of Detroiters and some Americans. But your many readers I trust will not forget the fact that there are always two sides to a question.

I will not undertake to follow seriatim what each reported individual may have said on the subject, (there being some eight or ten persons' views in all in and out of the city of Kingston) but I feel nite an interest in giving more than the probable results |of such a suicidal move, which reflection and

experience prompts. This is what commercial union means as expressed by the Chicago Times: "If the dominion will take our tariff laws as they are, and as congress may choose to modify them, and as our treasury department and courts may construe them, well and good. This country may agree to such an arrangement as that, but it will never agree to accept the dominion laws, or to put the whole business of tariff making out of the hands of congress and into the hands of some joint high commission representing the treatymaking functionaries of the United States and British governments. Unless, therefore, the dominion is prepared to make a complete and unconditional surrender of all control over its own tariff, and accept whatever tariff our congress may choose to exact from time to time, the scheme of commercial union, in the sense in which that phrase is used, is entirely out of the question. Surely no stronger language can be used to show how utterly the dominion locks herself up in the power of congress and her representatives of some sixty millions of people.

Be it remembered that in congress as well as in the dominion legislatures the representation is based in a great measure according to population and owing to the great preponderence of population on the one side, the other will ever be as a mere cipher in all things, and in the same ratio will her people preponderate over the dominion in | price \$1.25_ every branch of industry. Could you possibly see the inward motive of this yankee scheme"you would discover that their aim and desire is to secure the trade and business of the entire dominion to themselves, and in order to allure you into the trap of assent they very cunningly reverse the order.

The United States produces more than she can consume, both in agriculture of every description and of manufactures, and she wants our market for her surplus, and her chief aim is to destroy the industries and commerce of the country. She exports her cereals and live stock and manufactures to Europe and other countries, and certainly we have the same privilege and even more, because to-day we can do the same thing in our own steamers and by our own railways without depending on a foreign country for these facilities.

Last autumn some farmers from Dakota and Minnesota actually took their grain to Winnipeg, Manitoba, paying duty and freight and sold it there at better prices than they could get for it in their own country.

I have seen comparisons to show that relatively to corresponding points Canada and her farmers occupy even better positions than those of the United States. But some people have the presumption to quote prices obtained in the largest centres of trade and compare these with what rules in a city or town of one eighth or one fourth its size and never for a moment state what it costs to transport the goods to these centres. The editorial of the Provincialist, published in Boston, Mass., says, in the issue of June 30th: "We see the statement made that the young people leave their provincial homes by the score to seek employment in 'the States.' But to these young people 'the States' mean a very few centres of business, and outside of these centres there are as many deserted farms and tenantless houses, and as great a dearth of young people in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and other New England states, as can be found in the maritime provinces in proportion to population. Take Massachusetts even - the, Mecca for most provincials—and two evils are met by all, intensely close competition in the cities, and 'no business' in the coun try. The exceptions to this are about the same in the two countries under comparison." Again it says: "The cry of a few unthinking people, that annexation would help the provinces, is nonsense. Nine-tenths of the states in this republic are as badly off or even worse off. That they belong to the United States does not help them a particle though many of them have great natural advantages." And yet again he adds: "Outside of the employment given in the manufacturing centres to the thousands of immigrants from our old home (and from every part of New England as well) all the

balance is in favour of the provinces." Some politicians make the bold cry fto stir up strife, or to try and set the farmers against the manufacturers by saying) "Oh, the protection by the N. P. is to make the few rich at the cost of the many." Yet it certainly is within the recollection of your many readers that previous to the change, made in 1879, the farmers could hardly sell their produce and why ' Because for want of protection the manufacturers had to close their shops, all business became paralyzed, and as the Irishman said, "I could buy a chicken for 6d., but I had no 6d. to buy it with." Farmers can see the difference today, and upon sober reflection, and when unsurrounded by politicians, are as a whole well satisfied to be left as they are. Merchants and manufacturers who will weigh the subject carefully will conclude also that commercial union will do them no good, but worse, will bring positive ruin to their pre-

sent prospects. It has been said that if confederation of the provinces was considered of such great advantage to the several provinces concerned how much greater would be the advantage to confederate with the great republic at the south of us. The answer to this idea so ingeniously put is very simple. The provinces are each governed by their own legislatures, independently, and as a consequence were too contracted in their operations, and confederation to them meant a natural expansion as one family, having no identity, and sacrificing no cherished usuages or laws, having an absolute supreme legislature to cement, expand and foster the interest of their entire dominion, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, pure and simple for their own benefit, and surely there is evidence enough | UUN to day to satisfy all that this has been accomplished to a wonderful degree, except to those who are so politically blind as to imagine and assert that no good can come from Nazareth. On the other hand, commercial union, annexation or confederation with the United States would be the reverse. of that just explained, because in the latter case we would lose our identity in everything, we would be entirely absorbed or swallowed up by a people or government more than ten times our number, and whose power is not to be interfered with by us in anyway as the Chicago Times puts it, as

we would be obliged to accept their laws,

their tariffs, and whatever they saw fit to do

This dominion is only 20 years old and just contemplate her wonderful stride of progress, everywhere we can see substantial improvement, yet we should not expect that instanter we must have larger cities and greater populations than the United States possesses, after over a century's growth. We Canadians are not one whit behind the Yankees in point of skill, education, practical appliances, ingenuity, and business knowledge; only in the matter of "push" do they outdo us, and for that reason we must not shut our eyes to the fact that they would soon "push" us out of their way not only in their own country but even here also. It is that very element that is now at work to outwit us in the false cry of commercial union, so as to get control of our entire business. The alluring idea of giving us their market is just as absurd as it would be to expect a practical farmer to give his neighbour a highly cultivated farm while he would be content to work on a swamp or stony mound without soil. Every traveller or salesman you could put into the market in the United States or even Canada would find more than fifty competitors at every step he took.
