The season has been so dry that the Canadians have not feed necessary to winter them, and after the factories there clese many more will be for sale.

THE BARLEY MARKET.

WHITBY, Sept. 14.-The Chronicle publishes the opinion on the barley market of D. C. Downey, who took to Oswego, last week, on the schr. W. Jamieson, the first boat load of barley this year. While in Oswego he spent a good deal of time studying the barley question, and he is under the impression that the barley trade will never again bloom like it used to years ago. Years ago it was a disgrace for a malster to be found using Western barley, and during that period Canadian barley was the only article in demand; but lately, since beer is not brewed to keep for any length of time, but is always drunk the same season it is made, the Western barley does almost as well as Canadian, and is used extensively. Just now barley is beginning to pour in from the west, and the market will be glutted as long as there is any to come from that direction, for the western fellows don't hold back a minute, but sell at the proper time for whatever they can get. The sample of barley this year is not so bad as expected, but is not up to that of last year. Another feature in the market on the other side of the line is that the malsters over there un derstand one another pretty well and can't be drawn into any keen competition.

Sherman Bres., extensive grain dealers at Buffalo, have written to Mr. H. Mooers here to the effect that 500,000 bushels of barley are en route to Buffalo from the west at 62c. and 65c. Mr. Mooers states that as long as barley can be got in the west at these rates grain from this section of the country will be shut out of the markets. Dealers here cannot afford to pay all the attending expenses of transportation and sell barley at the prices mentioned.

HOP MARKET.

UTICA, Sept. 12 .- There is as yet no market established for hops. No sales of the late variety are reported, except such as were made by contract some time ago. Picking progresses slowly, that being deemed best on account of the slow maturing of the crop. Rain has interfered somewhat also with the harvesting. Probably it will be two or three weeks yet before any settled market is formed. Prices remain about the same nominally, and are quoted at 18 @ 20
