### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, Sept. 14. - The past week has not been remarkable for 113 briskness, though considerable business was done principally in the fruit line. Last Friday and Saturday there was a rush for peaches. The supply was great and the baskets went at \$1.25 each, the lowest figures paid here for years for delicious fruit. The fruit has gone up again and cannot be touched under \$1.50. Pears have also been plentiful and quoted from \$1.20 to \$2 per bushel. Plums are offering in small lots at \$2 per bushel. There is a plentiful supply of fall apples at 50c. to 75c. per bag, Grapes bring 4c. to 6c.

Potatoes selling at 90c. to \$1 per bag and the other vegetables at the prices quoted last week.

The cattle market has been fairly active. American dealers have been through the country picking up all the dairy cows they can. The farmers (having very little feed for them) are not disinclined to sell, even though they only bring from \$12 to \$15 each. Milch cows, in good condition are selling at \$25 to \$35 each. Butchers' stock is quoted at 11c. to 21c. per to live weight, or \$4 to \$5.50 per quarter. Lambs retail at

\$2 to \$3 each and sheep at \$3 to \$4 each. ('hickens are worth from 35c, to 50c, per pair and are supplied in great quantity. Turkeys sell, but few of them, at \$1.50 to

The fish market is well supplied just now with pike at 6c. per fb.; pickerel, bass and addock at 7c. per fb.; salmon and white Hell 10c. per fb., and mackerel 15c. per fb. (), ters are offered at 50c. to 60c. per quart. Butter is selling at 22c fo 25c, per 1b. and is in good demand. Packed butter at 17c. to 20c. per fb. Eggs are advancing in

value and bring 15c. to 18c. per dozen.

A little barley is coming to the city just now. It ranges in weight from 42 to 46 lbs. and is of good colour. It brings from 50c. to 55e. per bushel. The other figures quoted for grains are : Oats, 32c. per bushel rye, 50c. per bushel; peas, 50c. to 55c. per bushel, and wheat, 75c. to 80c. per bushel. Flour is worth from \$4.25 to \$4.50 per bbl.; bran, 90c. per cwt.; shorts, \$1.60 ner cwt.; cornmeal, \$1 50 to \$1.60 per cwt., and oatmeal, \$4.50 to \$4.75 per bbl.

#### A BIG HOP YARD.

James F. Clark owns the largest hop yard in America, situated at Otsego, N.Y. It contains 126 acres of vines, 96 of which are in full bearing this season. The work of picking the crop has just commenced, and 400 pickers are employed, including men, women and youths, whose wages average \$1 the crop. The regular working force of the yard through the season is twenty-five men and seventeen teams. Among the supplies required are 65,000 poles and 5,000 pounds of twine. The crop for the present season is estimated 150,000 pounds. It is already sold under a five years' contract to an Albany dealer, who takes the entire product of the yard during that period at 20c. a fb.

CHARLES SUMNER.

His Kindness Toward His Clerks-Visiting the Sick and Those in Prison.

Perhaps something of the senator's kindness of heart may be well shown by his treatment of his successling clerks when they were ill. One of them was suffering from an attack of of fever and ague. He occupied a room in the senator's house. The shakes were followed by a fever that had drenched the poor fellow in perspiration and left him exhausted. He had no knowledge of the peculiar nature of the disease, and thought himself very ill; but the senator, who had seen him from time-to time, pooh-poohed the idea, and urged him to rise, dress and dine with him when he would meet some pleasant people. He tried to rise, but was too weak. The senator said that he would soon put strength into him, and bringing a bottle of rare old Burgundy and a goblet of cracked ice, filled the glass; then raising the poor fellow's head on his knees, he held the glass while the clerk drank the contents. Its effect was magical; it was a draft upon his latent strength, and he was enabled to appear at dinner and play his part well with his knife and fork, and to assist really in entertaining the guests present.

Afterward another of his clerks was temporarily ill, but so much so that he was forced to keep his bed. He had brought his wife and child with him, and they were living in such rooms as it was possible to obtain in Washington during the war. While they answered their purpose, they were not exactly fitted for the reception of visitors. One day the lady was surprised and embarrassed by finding the senator at her door, smilingly demanding to see his sick friend. The clerk got well rapidly, and was soon able to attend to his business again, and he felt that the call was made in all kindness and sympathy.

At one time his private secretary became quite ill and remained so for some weeks, The senator kept himself well informed as to his condition, and when he began to get better, arranged for him a long trip into health giving regions; and finding that financial reasons precluded the taking of the prescribed journey, he sent him a check as an advance payment for future services. The invalid was as much encouraged by the senator's evident belief that he would certainly be able to resume his functions as by the trip itself; at any rate, between the two he recovered his strength, and his family attributed his recovery largely to the senator's kindness.

He not only visited the sick, but those also who were in prison. The New Bedford schooner called the Pearl sailed for the north in 1848 from Washington with seventy-six escaping slaves on board. She was pursued and brought back, the slaves were sent to their owners, and the captain, Mr. Drayton, with the mate, Mr. Sayres, were imprisoned in the Washington city jail for having the negroes on board of their vessel. Mr. Sumner often visited these poor men, and he also did what he could for their comfort. He often visited others who also in his opinion were improperly incarcerated. He had little time for mere social calls; and the time came finally when his own strength left him to such an extent that he availed himself of the privilege of the oldest member of the senate-Pater Senatus he was called-and he seldom returned a call, and hardly made one except from time to time upon a sick friend, or when the exigencies of etiquette made it extremely necessary.-Arnold Burges Johnson in The Cosmopolitan.

Naval Strength of the World.

It appears from the "Universal Register" for 1887, issued by the committee of "Lloyd's Register of British and Foreign Shipping," that "Great Britain has 6 guns capable of penetrating 36 inches of unbacked iron, and 16 others which can penetrate 28 inches of the same material. Italy has 20 guns which can penetrate 33 inches of iron. France 14 guns which can pierce 27 inches, and 14 others able to penetrate 25 inches of unbacked iron. Russia has 20 guns and Spain 2 equal to the penetration of 24 inches of iron, and no other power has any guns capable of an equivalent result. In other words, of guns able to penetrate 24 inches of unbacked iron, Frace has 28; Italy, 20; Russia, 20; Spain, 2; and Great Britain, 22. Next, regarding the speed of their war ships, we find the several powers stand as follows:

"Ships of 20 knots and above: England, 1; France, 1; Italy, 10; Spain, 2, and other European nations, 4. Of 19 knots speed England has 11 ships; France, 10; Germany, 3; Italy, 2, and other nations, 9. Of 18 knot ships England has 5; France, 7; Germany, 2; Italy, 6, and other nations, 6. Our supremacy is, however, chiefly seen in 17 knot ships, of which we have 25, mounting 181 guns; France, 4 of 20 guns; Italy, 5 of 40 guns; and other nations, 4 of 19 guns. England has 11 ships of 90 guns that can steam 16 knots, whereas France has 3 only of 58 guns. At 15 knots France beats us with 16 ships of 214 guns, as compared with our 12 ships of 126 guns; and at 14 knots France has 28 ships of 334 guns, whereas we have only 15 ships of 252 guns. Summarizing these figures, it appears that with speeds above 14 knots we have 80 ships of 795 guns; France, 69 of 690 guns; Germany, 35 of 285 guns, and Italy, 41

of 201 guns." Out of a total mercantile tonnage now afloat of 20,943,650, Great Britain and her colonies own 10,539,136. The total steam mercantile tonnage of the world is 10,531,843, and of this Great Britain and her colonies own no less than 6,595,871, or nearly twothirds of the whole.—Scientific American.

It Was Nothing Serious.

La one of the city's most select and quiet localities, the other evening, cries of alarm and repeated calls for the police were heard issuing from a house occupied by a most respectable family, and the neighborhood became greatly alarmed. All sorts of conjectures were indulged in, some fearing that murder was in progress, while others believed that a burglar had been encountered. Just as the police reached the house the noise subsided, the door was quietly opened, and the gentleman at the head of that particular household came out and remarked to the officers that he was sorry for the disturbance occasioned; but there was no serious trouble. A gentleman lodger was exploring the kitchen, in the dark, for some refreshment, and had put his foot into a trap which the cook had set to entel a particularly thievish rodent. The war dance indulged in by the bapless lodger, and the yells he emitted as he hopped about on one foot, while the trap maintained its grip on the other, was the secret of the disturbance.- Eoston Dudget "Chunterer."
