

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

The Widespread Fondness for Rowing and Sailing on Fine Nights,

"What is the matter with the moonlightexcursions nowadays/ a reporter asked of an Last river pilot the other day while on the way down the Harfem river. "A few years ago they were all the rage."

"They are just as popular now as ever before," inturned the pilot, "but people prefer to enjoy them in small boats. Rowing by moonlight is growing in favor more and more every year. The time once was when boat houses along the river and shows of the bay closed their doors at sundown, but now some of them never open until that hour. The reasons for this are many. Aquatics have a stronger place in the hearts of the people now than ever before; more people know how to handle these small craft nowadays than they did a few years ago; women more fond of the water than formerly, and they make their busbands, brothers or friends take them out for a row on pleasant evenings. Then, again, it is no longer considered improper to go out upon the river with a lady after dark. It is always cool in the evening, and the illumination of the waters in and around New York is such at the present time that the darkness exists in a very metch modified form. The Harlem river and the North river above Spuyten Duyvil creek are alive with boats every night. After 8 o'clock on a bright night it is almost impossible to hire a boat, so popular has moonlight sailing or rowing become, The cheapness of the thing recommends it. For fifty or seventy-five cents six persons can enjoy three hours on the river, which is only a little more than ten cents each. Many persons own their own canoes and boats, and have them fitted up with soft cushions, expensive rugs and other conveniences that make them all the more desirable and comfortable.

"The craze this year is cedar gigs. These beats are light and are sharp at the bow and stern. The man rows, while the lady who sits in front of him on a cane seated sliding chair, acts as coxswain. There is greater risk in using these boats, however, than rowing in the regular round bottomed boats, for the lady sits too high, and only those who can manage an egg-shell boat ought to go out in them. Working girls often make up a party and go out rowing. After a day spent behind the counter, at the bench or machine or before the typewriter, I know of no more sensible recreation. Young women, as a rule, learn to handle an oar during their brief vacations at the sea shore, and I must say that since it became the fashion to spend vacations at such places the number of girls who can manage a boat has greatly increased. The moonlight excursion is not a thing of the past by any means. It is yet in its infancy. Some day you will see on our rivers and bay such scenes as those of which we read as occurring claily and nightly on the Italian lakes."-New York Mail and Express.

What Becomes of Old Furniture?

To the uninitiated it seems strange what becomes of all the second hand furniture, and yet although so much of it is thrown on the market, the demand is always greater than the supply. I make sometimes three or four residence sales in a week, besides my large sale at the auction rooms every Saturday, selling some weeks several thousand dollars worth of property. People in moving find a lot of odds and ends that are of no use to them, they send them to the auction house, some one buys them, carts them home to use until they tire of them, then the stuff is again sold, changing hands until it is worn out and worthless, finally being burned up. There are hundreds of furnished room houses which are supplied from auction sales. Young housekeepers who want to economize also very often fit up from auction, picking up very nice goods at low prices. People leaving the city to reside elsewhere send their entire household effects to the auction rooms, realizing generally about fifty cents on the dollar of original cost. Sometimes they sell their property to second hand dealers, who clean up the furniture, bring it to auction, and realize an immense profit.

A rather laughable incident occurred several weeks ago. A gentleman, in the west end sold to a dealer a very handsome but rather back number bedroom suit. The dealer transformed the set by cutting down the high top bed and dressing case to more modern proportions, cleaned it up, varnished it nicely and brought it to the auction rooms. Mr. West End happens in during the sale, takes a notion to the really handsome set, buys it, carts it home and is none the wiser until his sharp eyed wife dispels the bargain illusion by informing him that he had bought back his own furniture at 200 per cent. profit to the smart dealer. Mr. West End, sadder but wiser, sends the set back to be resold, and the dealer smiles. - Alexander A. Selkirk in Clobe-Democrat.

An Ethnological Question.

As it requires something more than the accident of birth in France to make a Frenchman, or in Holland to make a Dutchman, or in Cork to make an Irishman, so it requires something more than the accident of birth within the geographical boundary of this America to make a Yankee. A person born in Patagenia, of Mongolian or Ethiopian parents, is no less an American than a person born in Chicago or Washington of foreign parents. But neither the one nor the other is by reason of the accident of birth a Yankee.

The names Briton, German, Irish, Yankee, etc., denote distinct families of men that are distinguishable from each other, as the children of different parents are, by certain family likenesses and unlikenesses which are not obliterated by mere place of birth. To obliterate them there must take place what is called assimilation, and this rarely appears in the first generation, and never in the case of foreigners of a different race.

Among persons of kindred races, the process of assimilation is more rapid. The offspring of Britons in this country are not easily distinguished from the purest Yankees; in fact, Britons themselves who migrate in early life are not, race and language being the same.-Chicago Times.


New Sugar Processes.

The march of improvement in manufacturing methods has invaded the sugar industry. There is now in competition with the diffusion process invented by ex-Governor Warmouth, of Louisiana, what, if its merits be not overstated, is a formidable rival. By diffusion, the sugar of the cane is extracted in the form of a very weak liquid composed largely of water. It is claimed that 130 pounds of sugar will be produced by this system from a ton of cane, a gain of about 80 per cent. on the results obtainable by the old system. But the solution is so weak that getting rid of the water by evaporation almost absorbs the value of the additional sugar gained. Mr. Yasgan, of Toledo, O., invented, about a year ago, a system of multiple effect evaporation, which, it is said, will overstep this objection. By his method the evaporation is performed within coils of pipe surrounded by steam or other heating medium, but a small quantity of liquid being within the coil at any one time. The main advantage claimed for the system is economy of fuel. The machines are automatic, and the system is applicable to glue, wood pulp, liquors, condensal milk, caustic soda, etc. - Demorest's Montuly.






