A HERMIT HIGHWAYMAN.

The Character That Has Been Frightening so Many Good People in Sidney.

Belleville, Sept. 17.—Constable Johnston has solved the Sidney mystery, a man, who, during August, made his appearance in the township and, while the farmers were at work in the harvest field, attempted to frighten their wives at the point of the pistol. Last week he stopped young Hyde on the road and demanded the price of the load of hay which he had just sold in the city. The lad put whip to the horses and started up the road, followed by the stranger, who, all the time, threatened to shoot him if he did not stop.

Constable Johnston has identified the man as Robert Cummerford, a funatic, aged thirty-five. Twelve years ago he married daughter of Mr. Meredith's, Belleville. Meredith lived with his second wife when Cummerford succeded after a time in alienating his father in law's affections from his better half. She was left while her faithless husband drew his money from the bank, about \$800, and bought a farm four miles from Frankford. Here Meredith settled down with his daughter and son-in law. About four years ago he mysteriously disappeared and until this day his whereabouts have always been shrouded in mysterv.

Two years ago Cummerford sold the farm and deserted his wife, now living in a small shanty on the land. He returned a few months later, but has not lived on the place since. Six months ago he became insane, and has since been making himself troublesome in the manner stated. Mrs. Meredith has eked out a living, since deserted by her husband, by keeping boarders and renting a part of her place.

Miss Van Zandt shuns the reporters, who seem to have incurred her enmity by fully reporting the anarchists' imprisonment and her devotion to them. Aside from Spies they all look upon her every visit as one of the brightest occasions of the day. She greets each one with kind words.

WAS HE KICKED TO DEATH?

Man Dies in a Cell-Police Charged With Fatally Injuring Him.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 17.-On Sunday night Thomas Bourke, a well-to-do citizen, 66 years of age, went home intoxicated and began raising a disturbance with his wife. Three policemen were summoned and arrested him. Without any examinations he was put into a cell, and on Sundaythe was sent to the workhouse. "LORD" . TICHBORNE AS A LADLER OUT OF BAD WHISKEY.

The Embarrassments of Elections - The Swindler of O'Donovan Rossa - Indecencies of Journalism and the Only Apology That Can be Offered for

(COPYRIGHTED, 1887.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 15. - It only seems like the other day since all England was ablaze with the excitement of the Tichborne trial. From Land's End to Yarmouth and from the Isle of Wight to the Tweed great meetings were held to sustain the Tichborne claimant, and over two hundred thousand pounds was raised in his behalf, which was squandered in the English law courts. The lawyers engaged on both sides were among the ablest men in the kingdom, and whatever the merits or demerits of the Australian fraud, the learned judge who presided at the trial gained an infamous notoriety by the partiality of his rulings and his brutal treatment of the opposing counsel, which shocked the English love of fair play, which has been the distinguishing characteristic of Britons back to the remotest ages. The sympathies of an Englishman are generally with the under dog in the tight, and this feeling it was which roused all England to aid this gigantic fraud. It was the common people of England against a supposed crime by its titled aristocracy, and yet in defence of the rights of a titled aristocrat; never was there such a paradox. The hod carrier, the coal heaver and the poorly paid navvy gave freely part of his scant earnings to fight the Tichborne battle. The result, as the world knows, was the conviction of the arch-conspirator after one of the most remarkable trials on the criminal calendar and the financial ruin of the Tichborne family; a ruin from which it is doubtful if it will ever recover. The cause of all this ruin is now in New York and in very questionable company.

For many years Chatham street has been a most unsavory locality in the city; where it joins Chatham square and runs into the Bowery it swarms with sharpers and thieves. Cheap restaurants, dirty rum shops and disreputable lodging houses line the streets on either side, while many of the shops whose windows are filled with taded trinkets and plated jewelry are simply fences where burglars know they can get rid of their stolen goods and pick-pockets are assured of a welcome by the sign outside, "Old gold and silver bought and sold." The saloons are of the lowest and most villainous class and find no parallel in any other part of New York. The Five Points is within pistol shot; Pell street, with its dives and its opium joints, within a stone's throw; Mott street, with its foul-smelling Chinese and its dirty Italian lazaroni, forms a part of this villainous colony; and it is here in a rum-shop No. 10 Chatham Square that the Lord of Tichborne

has cast his lot. A man carrying in his veins the proud blood of a race that came over with the conqueror would have died before he would have sunk to this wretched and miserable estate. Death would have less terror for him than such a life; but there he can be seen daily dealing out the vile liquors to those who visit his den, and if there is any man in Enggland or elsewhere who still believes in the Tichborne claimant, one sight of him behind his dirty bar will banish his romance for-

As we approach the elections we are confronted by an interesting problem, and that is the division of election inspectors among the different political parties. Up to the present election Irving Hall, as one of the political factors, has always had some sort of recognition, and its perfect autonomy and strict discipline has always secured for it from one party or the other a reasonable di vision of the spoils. At the last election, however, the county democracy would have none of it. Tammany Hall did not want it: so to get even with its arrogant coadjutors it threw the weight of its influence and political experience in favor of Henry George and the labor party, and the result was sixty. seven thousand votes for the wage-winners, and in addition to his personal service, Jimmy O'Brien, the Irving Hall leader, sent his check to the Anti-Poverty society for six thousand dollars.

AN AMBITIOUS WOMAN.

The Manifesto Issued by the Count of Paris Ascribed to His Wife.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The manifesto of the Count of Paris was much better received by the Bonapartist than the Legitimist press. M. Bloutiz, the Paris correspondent of the Times, a strong partisan of the Count of Paris, compares him to a gentleman who followed a circus in the hope of seeing the lion tamer eaten, but it was never known whether the lion tamer or the gentleman died first. Parisians say the manifesto comes from a man who will wait until a fresh Sedan gives him a chance of stepping in quietly on the shoulders of a revolution. On the whole the manifesto has created much more impression here than in Paris. Probably he was induced to issue the manifesto by his wife, who is a very ambitious

The manifesto under ordinary circumstances would have been futile, but the count has issued it at a moment when it will be likely to effect Rouvier's ministry. To the loyalist party it looks for support. In fact the loyalists occupy much the same position in France toward the government as the unionists do in England to the conservative government. To cut locse altogether from the counsel of the loyalists and to ignore their suggestions would be to court political death.

OPPOSED TO THE THIRD PARTY.

Mayor Howland's Firm Opinion of the Recent Resolutions of Prohibitonists.

TORONTO, Sept 17 .- Mayor Howland was not present at the Scott act convention, when it was decided to form a third political party with prohibition as its chier plank. This does not at all conform with the views of his worship who said: "The formation of a third party is contrary to my judgment. My advice has been and will be to keep themselves free, so that they may act on principle. There is a disintegration of parties now in progress, and in the coming reformation we will constitute, if we stand firm, an element that must be considered by any party that is going to rule the country. We will be needed to assist to carry the party to victory. To separate ourselves and so withdraw our influence from the other parties at a critical time is an action taken with out proper discernment. But I feel that the common sense of the tempérance people as a whole will prevent its consummation."
