COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

PRINCE EDWARD HOP CROP.

The hop crop, which is so important a feature in the agricultural resources of Prince Edward county, is now pretty well gathered in. This has been done under very favorable conditions and the crop is on the whole a fairly good one, far exceeding that of last year, which was almost an entire failure, although scarcely up to the crop of 1885. There are in this country about forty-five growers who raise say from half a ton upwards; and the estimate of experts is that the hop product of this country for the present year will be about 80 tons, which, at 25c per 16 gives a value of \$40,000, a sum which will go a long way towards levelling up the shortage in barley and peas. Prices are not yet fixed as the extent of the sugar. damage done by the late storm in England has not been accurately ascertained.

He was struck dumb with horror on finding that one of his bullets had entered the temple of young Gordon, and that life was instinct.
