YOUNG FOLKS' COLUMN.

ESTIMATING SIZES AND DISTANCES BY THE EYE ALONE.

Gen. McClellan's Fine Charger, "Handsome Dan"—Interesting Facts About the Largest Beast of Prey in the Polar Regions and His Victims.

On the long stretches of ice covered coast in the polar regions, the largest beast of prey of the north, the white or polar bear, lives undisturbed by all other animals. The food of polar bears consists principally of the refuse of the sea, that is, the bodies of the larger animals, which are washed up by the sea. They also attack living seals and walrus, and the deep scars on the body of the latter, which are taken by the seal hunters, prove that the bears are not afraid to attack these immense creatures.

The bears prefer to surprise the walrus in his sleep, and at such a time a bear will fix his teeth in a walrus' neck and hold him while he strikes him with his paw; first stunning and then killing him. If, by scout or sight, a bear discovers seals sleeping on the ice, he slips noiselessly into the water and swims to the desired place, rises, under the protection of a ledge, if possible, so as to obtain a good view of his prey, and selects a seal which is sleeping near the edge of the ice. Then he approaches his victim, strikes him a sudden, heavy blow with his paw, breaking his back, and throws the unfortunate seal about on the ice, while his companions hasten back into the water.

Handsome Dan.

When Gen. McClellan took command of the army in West Virginia, he was presented with a fine charger named "Dan Webster." The horse was dappled mahogany bay in color, with white feet, and a star, a heavy black mane and a long tail, sixteen hands high, and weighing 1,250 pounds. He was of Sir Archy and Messenger blood, with an intelligent head, beautifully arched neck, muscular shoulders, a broad, deep chest, and every point about him remarkable for strength and beauty. As a parade horse he had few equals, carrying his head as high as his rider's when mounted, and his throat latch and the tips of his forefeet almost on a perpendicular line when in repose. He had several curious characteristics. For instance, he would not stamp his feet, or shake off a fly, if there were a thousand on him, if his master was on his back reviewing a passing column. To his own species he paid no attention, passing among them without dignifying them the slightest notice, even when turned loose in the same yard or field. He would stand anywhere he was left without constraint, and "the boys" used to say that "Handsome Dan" was as brave as a lion and as discreet as a judge.

"Watches" on Ocean Steamers.

On ocean steamers the officers and sailors are divided into two watches, and keep watch and watch, from the time of departure from one port until the time of arrival at the other. These watches are: First watch, from 8 p. m. till midnight; middle watch, from midnight till 4 a. m.; morning watch, from 4 a. m. till 8 a. m.; forenoon watch, from 8 a. m. till noon; afternoon watch, from noon till 4 p. m.; then come the dog watches, the first from 4 p. m. till 6 p. m.; the second from 6 p. m. till 8 p. m. By this arrangement seven instead of six watches are made, the intention being to change the turn of the night watch every twenty-four hours.

Measuring by the Eye.

There is a wonderful difference in the power which different persons possess of estimating sizes and distances by the eye alone. The faculty of estimating sizes and distances by the eye is susceptible of wonderful cultivation. It is very valuable when one wants to pick out quickly an article of proper size.

There are, however, certain influences which, unless guarded against, will often lead one astray as to the real size of an object. The presence of a series of lines upon an object has a great influence upon the appearance as regards size. To illustrate this fact is given the cut, showing a square space, divided horizontally by a series of lines. The height and width of this space are exactly equal, as may be proven by measurement, but to the eye they appear very unequal.

DISTRESS FOR RENT.

The New Law Which Goes Into Effect on October 1st—The Exemptions.

Two short acts, passed by the Ontario Legislature last session, are creating a great deal of discussion. These are the act respecting distress for rent and the act providing for the exemption of certain goods from seizure on execution. Each act is the complement of the other and will come into operation on October 1st.

An important change, brought about by the act for distress, is that which exempts the goods of lodgers from seizure for rent due the landlord by the tenant. If the tenant makes a general assignment to his creditors, the landlord can only collect the arrears of rent due from the time of the assignment. The goods of a tenant are exempt from seizure upon certain conditions. For example, a tenant is in arrears for rent and then refuses to vacate the house when warned to do so by the landlord his goods are not exempt from seizure. The purpose of the act is to give protection to those tenants who will do right themselves by complying with the conditional clauses of the act. If a tenant is say two months behind in rent, the landlord, if he chooses, can give him fifteen days' notice to leave. If at the end of that period the tenant leaves his goods are exempt from seizure; but if he does not do so the landlord has the power to distrain goods and chattels as by former acts, and apply the money to the payment of the rent and the cost of the seizure.

The goods exempt from seizure providing the tenant complies with the law are: The bed, bedding, and bedsteads in ordinary use by the debtor and his family. The necessary wearing apparel of himself and family. Cooking stove with pipes and furnishings, one other heating stove, one crane and its appendages, one pair of andirons, one set of cooking utensils, one pair of tongs and shovel, one coal scuttle, one lamp, one table, six chairs, one washstand, six towels, one looking-glass, one hair brush, one comb, one bureau, one clothes press, one clock, one carpet, one cupboard, one broom, twelve knives, twelve forks, twelve plates, twelve teacups, twelve saucers, one sugar-bowl, one milk jug, one teapot, twelve teaspoons, two pails, one wash tub, two scrubbing brushes, one washboard, three smoothing irons, all spinning wheels and weaving looms in domestic use, one sewing machine and attachments, thirty volumes of books, one axe, one saw, one gun, six traps, such fishing nets and seines as are in common use.

The articles in the above sub-division must not exceed \$150 in value. All fuel, meat, fish, flour, vegetables, for the use of the family, and not to exceed \$50 in value; one cow, six sheep, four hogs, twelve hens, all of which not to exceed in value \$75; tools and implements to the value of \$100.

George P. Putnam's Sons have had the amusement of publishing "The Isles of the Princess, or The Pleasures of Prinkipo," for the general author, the Hon. S. S. Cox, with these pleasures set forth by illustration.
