BASEBALL GOSSIP.

Indianapolis will give big money for Ramsey, of Louisville. Every club in the national league has made money this season. The Cuban Giants have played 152 games. Of these only 38 were lost. Dalrymple is spoken of as the manager of the Pittsburgh club next season. The Mets' new pitcher, Fagan, comes from the Rutland, Vt., club. He hails from Troy. President Von der Ahe has agreed to play the Cuban Giants on Oct. 16, when the St. Louis club will play with the Detroit. Betting has already begun in St. Louis on the result of the world's championship series with Detroit. The Browns are favorites. Mike Kelly says that he does not know of a place in the country where the players are treated so well as by the Boston management.

Boston wants to buy Clarkson, of Chicago, and Thompson, of Detroit, for next year, and will give as much for them as they did for Kelly. It was on their western trips this season that the Boston lost their grip. On the first trip they were knocked out from second to third place, and on the second trip from third to fourth. The chances are that Dosecher and McQuade will umpire the world's championship series. Each organization will have its own man to work. Des Moines is the great base ball city of the northwest. With a population of but 40,000 to draw from the average attendance there has been nearly 2,000.

The Boston club estimates that it will clear about \$40,000 this season on the \$10,000 it invested on the great Mike Kelly. Not such a bad speculation after all. A man in New York claims to have invented a machine for manufacturing base balls, which has the capacity of turning them out at a rate of one a minute, or sixty an hour. Mike Kelly gets \$4,300 for the season, according to the latest report. The season lasts six months, from April 15 to October 15, as a rule. For one month's pay he gets \$716.66, or about \$30 for each game he plays. "A pair of gloves lost Chicago the pennant this year," said an enthusiast the other day. "Anson was too pig headed to wear gloves, and I find that he has made at least thirty-five errors by muffing thrown balls and lost about seven games in this way."

OUR DUMB ANIMALS. D. M. Hunter, of Mount Morris, Mich., owns a colt which has no eyes, having been born in that unfortunate condition. It is over a year old and rather more intelligent than the ordinary equine animal.

A strange customer came to the county jail at Marshall, Mich., recently, being nothing less than a mink, which walked into the front door of the jail, and was killed in one of the corridors by Turnkey Prentice's little boy.

The killing of squirrels, prairie dogs, bears, mountain lions, wolves, and coyotes is quite an expensive item in the yearly budget of Montana. From Jan. 1 to August, 1887, that territory paid in bounties for the killing of the same \$96,025.10.

One of the curiosities with the San Diego, Cal., exhibit at the St. Louis Grand Army national encampment will be a 600 pound turtle taken from the bay of Esenada de Todos Santos, in Lower California. After its huge proportions have been sufficiently viewed by the gathered thousands of boys in blue, turtle soup will be on the bill of fare.

It is about as difficult for a dog to get a really satisfactory scratch at his back as it is for a one armed man to rub his elbow, but a Hartford, Conn., dog does it. In front of his master's house is an old stone hitching post, which time and weather have made rough and scaly. Proceeding to this dog sits down, throws himself backward till he is leaning against the post, and then proceeds to rub his back as cleverly as a longshoreman or one of the ancient Scots who used to bless the Duke of Argyll.

NEW BOOKS. Society in Rome and London, as Ouida sees it, will be described in her forthcoming book. A new edition of Stanley's work, "How I Found Livingstone," will shortly be published.

Mr. C. R. Talbot, the author of that clever story for young people, "Honor Bright," has in press a story of Newport and yachting life. It is called "A Midshipman at Large." Houghton, Mifflin & Co. will publish shortly Professor Moses Colt Tyler's "Life of Patrick Henry." Professor Tyler has discovered and used all possible sources of information. A book which promises to be interesting is coming from the press in London. It is the work of Mr. Hanuan, a Scotchman, who has studied the Chinese in their own country, and who will describe under the garb of fiction phases of life in China.

Another book on Shakespeare, but in strong contrast to Mr. Donnelly's, is about to be published. The author is Mr. Denton J. Snider, formerly of St. Louis, who made "The System of Shakespeare," now out of print. Mr. Snider will not deal with the question of authorship at all, but produce a literary study of the plays. Frank R. Stockton's sequel to "Mrs. Lecks and Mrs. Aleshine" will be called "The Dussantes," and it is authoritatively announced that the new story will thoroughly and satisfactorily dispose of Mrs. Lecks, Mrs. Aleshine and other old friends, and will, moreover, tell all about the famous, but so far invisible, family whose name it bears.

MUSICAL NOTES. Marie Engle is to have \$20,000 for singing in American cities this winter. Mme. Patti's South American tour, under the management of Abbey, Schoeffel & Grau, will begin in Buenos Ayres next April. She will sail from Liverpool in March. Signor Verdi, the composer, is very busy with his hospital at Sant Agata. Every day he visits it and examines all the details of the building. It has cost him \$12,000. Gilmore, it is understood, wanted \$24,000 to swing his band around the circuit from New York to San Francisco. Cappa, it is known, has furnished music for something less.

Miss Juliette Cordon, a well known concert singer, has been engaged as prima donna of the new Boston Ideal Opera company, of which Messrs. Karl, Mac Donald and Barnabee are also members.

Mme. Patti has a fan on which are the autographs of all the sovereigns of Europe. The czar of Russia writes, "Nothing is so soothing as your singing." Queen Victoria remarks, "If King Lear is right in saying that a sweet voice is a precious gift in a woman you are the richest of women." The recent refusal of Patti to sing at the queen's request, as the compensation offered was not sufficient, adds interest to Victoria's words. They seem prophetic.
