

Signor Verdi, the composer, is very busy with his hospital at Sant Agata. Every day he visits it and examines all the details of the building. It has cost him \$12,000.


Gilmore, it is understood, wanted \$24,000 to swing his band around the circuit from New York to San Francisco. Cappa, it is known, has furnished music for something less.





