HERE AND THERE.

SCIENTIFIC SQUIBS.

Garlic has been administered in hydrophobia with good results. A solution of copperas applied to wood will render it very hard and durable.

A Boston man has patented an apparatus for blacking boots by electricity.

An Irishman, Francis Hazlett, has invented, and an Irish company has brought out, a mechanical apparatus for blowing glass bottles which dispenses with the old fashioned method of blowing glass by the mouth.

H. R. Stickney, of Portland, Me., has been running a two horse power engine for four years with kerosene of 130 tests. It requires three or four gallons daily. He will soon make a compound engine of the same kind.

The importance of soft water for domestic purposes is illustrated by the experience of a large London asylum, in which a change from hard to soft water has resulted in an estimated annual saving in soda, soap, labor, etc., of more than \$4,000.

The remains of no less than fifty-nine flowering plants found in mummy wrappings have been identified. The flowers even yet show their delicate colorings, the violet of the larkspur and the scarlet of the poppy still remaining, as well as the green of some leaves.

An English observer recommends the locomotive as a cheap hygrometer for farmers and others living near railroads. When the escaping steam remains long suspended the air is near its point of saturation with moisture, but when the steam quickly disappears, as if swallowed up, the weather is dry and there is little prospect of rain.
