





WHAT IT REALLY DOES.

The Success Following the Introduction of the Scott Act in the County.

Furnished by the W.C.T.U. Mayor Howland, of Toronto, has compiled some statistics regarding the volume of liquor consumed in the different provinces of the dominion. These figures are taken from the official blue-books up to June 30th, 1886; and when compared, province by province, show just exactly to what extent the much-abused Scott act, despite its many defects, has accomplished the work it was designed to do, in decreasing the con-

sumption of liquor : British Columbia, rum-ridden, consumes 73 gallons per head ;

Ontario, which had only one county under the Scott act before last year, consumed 47 gallons; Quebec, largely under parish prohibition, had a record of only 31 gallons;

Manitoba and the North-West Territories, the latter under statutory prohibition, 21 In New Brunswick, with the Scott act working in ten out of eighteen counties and Jas. Campbell's Wood Yard.
