LANGUAGE IS PLAIN.

Do we understand the Peterboro Review to say that Sir John Macdonald did not declare that the Dominion parliament could not check Manitoba? What is the meaning of the following language, which we have already quoted ?

"In order to give them a chance we have provided that the Dominion parliamentmind you, the Dominion parliament; we cannot check any other parliament, we cannot check Ontario, we cannot check Manitoba-shall, for the first ten years after the construction of the road, give their own road, into which they are putting so much money and so much land, a fair chance of existence."

This was the assurance of the premier when he made his famous speech in support of the Canada Pacific syndicate contract. Its meaning is indisputable, except by papers of the Review stamp, and for the party's sake it is prepared to dispute anything.

ELECTION NOTES.

The latest swap, in election petitions, concerns some thirty-two numbers of the local and dominion parliaments, and is the most elaborate effort that has yet been made to cover up the illegalities of the last two campaigns. Verily, as the Witness remarks, "the game of politics is being car ried pretty far in this Canada of ours. Right and wrong are totally ignored, and the representation of the constituencies is arranged to suit the convenience of party politicians and wire pullers."

The funny feature about the Shefford election is that somebody gave the respondent, Mr. Audet, an envelope containing \$500, a few days before the election, and he didn't know who gave it to him or where it came from. The case is parallel with that of a Kingston politician, into whose hand, in one election, a roll of bank bills was placed, as he stood in the British American, without his knowing the source or purpose

DATIN IN LUCK.

Mr. Davin (the only Nicholas Flood) was delighted to learn some time since that the British government was, on the Irish question, taking the action he had predicted as necessary, and the circumstances suggested the reading of Mr. Davin's 'Capadian speeches by the Earl of Salisbury. Now it is discovered that Mr. Gladstone has been making points indicative of "statesman-like grasp." "Indeed," says the Regina Leader, "Mr. Gladstone's arguments, going on exact lines with those of Mr. Davin, one might suspect the English liberal had a conversation with the Canadian conservative." That the great heads of Britain should be swelled with stolen ideas is somewhat remarkable, but not so much so when it is remembered to whom their creation is due. Mr. Davin was thought to have buried himself when he hied himself off to Regina, but location is a matter of small consequence when through men like Salisbury and Gladstone he can speak to millions of his countrymen and help to solve the problems that makeothers quake and quit.

PERPETUAL PENSIONS.

A determined effort is being made to put an end to the iniquitous system of perpetual pensions which annually gobbles up so much of the income of the British government. The house of commons select committee, ap. pointed to inquire how far the hereditary pensions, allowances and payments ought to be continued, has recommended that pensions, allowances and payment ought not in future be granted in perpetuity, on the ground that all such grants should be limited to the persons actually rendering the services intended to be rewarded by such grants, and that such rewards should be wholly or in main part defrayed by generation benefitted by the services so recognized; that it is unjust that future generations should be burdened with payments to persons who had no share in the original ser vices; that offices with salaries and without duties, or with merely nominal duties, ought to be abolished; that all existing perpetual pensions, allowances and payments, and all hereditary offices should be determined and abolished; that in all such commutations the lords of the treasury should take into consideration the circumstances of such pension, allowance, or payment, and whether or not any real service had been rendered by the original grantee, or was now performed by the actual holder of the office; that where no service, or merely nominal service, is rendered by the holder of an hereditary office, and where no service, or merely no minal service, was rendered by the original grantee of the pension, allowance, or payment attached to such office, the pension, allowance, or payment shall in no case continue beyond the life of the present holder or recipient; that in all cases the method of commutation ought to involve and ensure a real and substantial saving to the nation that the rate of commutation usually adopted, of about twenty-seven years' purchase, is too high. Since Jan. 1st, 1881, 330 pensions, payments and allowances, amounting in all to the annual sum of £18,957 9s. 6d.,

have been commuted by the payment of

£527,933 18s. 4d., and at rates of commuta-

tion varying from ten years' purchase. Some of these pensions appear to have been commuted, notwithstanding formal objections in writing lodged with the lords of the treasury, and without sufficient inquiry into the matter stated in such objections. That so much has been accomplished augurs well for the success of the greater reformatory movement which includes the revision of the general pension list. It is time, indeed, for action-and time it was forced upon an unwilling government-when, in 1886, over a million of an increase has come from the army lists in consequence of the wars of North and South Africa, 100,000 men, in good health, being paid for doing nothing, and their drawings amounting to nearly \$8,000, 000, or the equivalent of the whole income tax on the national profits of the preceding

THE TELEPHONE CRAZE.

Varied Experience in the Business-Only One Really Safe Investment.

Shareholder and Insurance Gazette. Periodically the people have a craze thrust on their notice, at one time a gold mine, at another a lead company that seeks to draw the hard earnings from the people's pockets. In ancient times it was the South Sea bubble that turned the heads of kings and senators who were ultimately engulfed in one grand maelstrom that ruined them by thousands. Montreal just now is quietly being flooded with telephonic schemes as flighty in imagination and as dubious in results as the black angel companies floated in the States, to the financial ruin of those who once prided themselves on being in affluent positions. It is against investing in these imaginary companies that we desire to caution our readers. But yesterday a new scheme was affoat to wipe out the Bell telephone company by reducing its tariff to \$35 per annum for subscribers; to-day another bubble company which wishes to reduce the price to \$12 is floating in the air. It is needless to say there is little room for the next fifty years for any competition such as is perhaps intended or desiring for sale. From personal inquiry we find that no person, director or otherwise, in the Bell company has ever received any bonus on his stock, and that that company has never sold a share below par for stock gambling purposes. It is not to be supposed, therefore, that any of the new concerns can place the shareholders in a better condition. Again the Bell telephone company, with its 4,000 or 5,000 miles of lines, connecting cities and towns, offers to its subscribers facilities which no other telephone company of can furnish. The Bell telephone company's dividends, which had the practical monopoly the past eight years; average about 5 per cent. Therefore it is certain that with its economical and conservative management it has been no special bonanza for its shareholders. Its stock sells to-day at about par. With two or three competitors in the field, and the consequent rate cutting, what prospect is there for dividends from any of them, since it is not to be supposed that the Bell telephone company will retire from the field. This then is a fair financial view of the matter as to the prospect of a new, poor and untried company paying any dividends. Knowing the large number of our subscribers who are shareholders in the Bell telephone company, we should be base to our trust did we not try to protect their

interest as well as prevent others from losing large amounts of money by investing in new bubbles which cannot by any possibility pay a fair dividend, if any at all. We find on still further enquiry that the Bell telephone company has to-day about 14,000 sets of instruments in use and owns between

4,000 and 5,000 miles of line, connecting cities and towns in Canada and the United States. It has also the exclusive right to connect with the system of the American Bell telephone company in the United States. Any person at all familiar with the business and the cost of construction can readily see that no company could duplicate this construction without a very large capital. Opposition may be a good thing, and where it has a chance of success a creditable thing, but where in common sense is there anything to be made with three or four companies in such a small population as we have in the dominion of Canada ? We have,

therefore, two desires in this matter, the first to protect our friends who have already invested in one company, and the second to protect those who may be solicited to invest in certain losses. Finally, what is there to prevent the Bell telephone company, with its wealthy and paid-up organization-in case of a doubtful success of their rivalsreducing the price of their subscription to such a point as would wipe out all and sun-

A ROW OF NATIONALISTS.

A Straight Appeal to Race Prejudices

And it Had the Desired Effect. MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—In case of T. J. J. Lessieur, charged with stealing monied letters from the post office, the counsel for defence appealed strongly to the national prejudices of the jury, and urged that six English men had been put on to intimidate six French-Canadians, to convict a compatriot. The jury were locked the whole night and fought like cats and dogs, the evidence neverbeing discussed, the only consideration was that the English wanted to put a good French-Canadian in jail. When brought into court they were six to six. His honor, speaking to the French-Canadian portion, told them that when they were brought before their Maker on the last day they would regret their verdict. Lessieur will be tried again in November.
