FLOWERS FOR FUNERALS.

Designs and Cost-A Rival of the Immortelle-Two Sets of Prices.

Among the endless number of designs that from time to time allorn the window of a well known east side florist is a five foot Bartholdi statue of the Goddess of Liberty. The pedestal is made of a solid bank of slate colored everlasting flowers, while the statue itself is made of rich dark reddish brown flowers that, although not exactly the color of weather beaten bronze, are very beautiful.

"How do you make such designs?" was asked of the florist,

"The model is first blocked out with wire, Then the flowers are put on with their stems squeezed in between the wires or tied to them with thread, as circumstances dictate. There has been a great change recently in the sorts of flowers used for these designs. Formerly we could use only the immortelles, the little quarter inch flowers with which every one is familiar, but which, as very few know, are imported from Germany at considerable expense. In place of the immortelles we now use Cape Mays. The Cape Mays are nearly an inch in diameter, and therefore fill up a design faster, which makes them more desirable for us. They are of a brighter and purer white, and when dyed the color shows brighter, and so the customer likes them

"Then you have to color your flowers arti-

"Yes, always. We first bleach them in a bath of sulphur vapor and then use common aniline dyes to give them the shades desired. The snowy whiteness of the whites is really artificial, although the natural color of the Cape Mays, whether grown wild as they do on Cape May or cultivated, is very beautiful. The desirable qualities in a flower for our purpose are purity of color and the quality of retaining its form and color when dried. These Cape Mays and the immortelies will last a year if they are kept free from dust and are not handled roughly."

"What is the latest thing in designs?" "The 'Scale of Life,' I guess. It consists of a wire scale made something like a druggist's scale. The beam is usually covered with silver colored flowers and the standard with something in imitation of bronze, while the base will be darker still. A dove may be

perched above the top." "What does it cost?"

"Anywhere from \$10 to \$100. The prices of flowers for funerals depend so much on circumstances that no list can be given. You can buy, for instance, a sheaf of wheat, or a beautiful wreath, or a small pillow for \$2. Larger ones would cost \$5 to \$10. A broken column or a clock that may be set to the hour at which the deceased died would cost from \$10 to \$25. One person would pay \$40 for a large model of a yacht to be used at the funeral of a yacht owner, while if a seaman on a yacht should die and his shipmates wanted the same piece to put on his coffin, they could get it for \$25 or \$30. If an elevated train man dies, his comrades can get a handsome floral car for \$30. The same car would cost the friends of Mr. Gould in case of his death \$50 or \$60-possibly \$75 or \$100 if bought on Fifth avenue. Pieces called the 'Gates Ajar' and the 'Heavenly Arches' may be had as low as \$8, but they are usually put together of a size to command \$12 or \$15. The fact is, the flowers on the coffin cost more than the tomb in which the deceased is placed in many cases, and we get money that ought to go for food for those left behind. Saying that won't help my business, but it's the truth. It is no uncommon thing for people to spend the earnings of a year in a funeral, and it often happens that the flowers cost more than the family will save in three

"It shows respect for the dead, doesn't it?" "No, it doesn't. It shows a pitiful desire to make a spread for the benefit of one's neighbors; to create a talk through the ward. It comes of the sort of pride that goes before destruction."-New York Sun.

Hard on the Horses.

"I came down pretty early the other morning," said a Market street merchant, "and on my way I passed one of our wagons, and I hope I may die if there weren't twelve men in it taking a ride. About 9 o'clock I sent for the driver and told him what I had seen. He was a little frightened, but not much. 'That's nothing,' he said, at length, 'we all give our friends a lift down town. Some of the drivers bring down twenty every morning.' I was very indignant and cautioned him against using my wagons again for stage purposes. He grumbled a little and tried to argue that it made no difference to the horses. About a ton weight made no difference! I finally had to discharge him as a warning to the other drivers. Since then I have noticed the wagons of business firms, and I find that it is quite a common thing for the drivers to give their friends a ride in the morning and evening. It is a bad practice-that is, bad for the horses."-Philadelphia Call.

Rough on the Maiden Ladies.

They have a custom at the Andrew Presbyterian church, Minneapolis, which has brought great consternation to the widows and maiden ladies. It began with the children and extended to the congregation. On each Sunday following a birthday the person who has thus shuffled off another year marches to the front and drops as many pennies in the missionary box as he is years old. It can readily be seen how embarrassing this is to many. They resort to all sorts of tricks to avoid divulging the truth. Sometimes a lady will put in over a dollar, and as everybody knows she is not a hundred years old, it lets her out of the dilemma. The missionary box is the gainer.—Pioneer Press.

First Governor of Illinois. Few people nowadays, if asked who was the first governor of Illinois, would answer Patrick Henry. Yet this is the case. An act was passed by the authorities of Virginia in October, 1778, creating the county of Illinois (in the state of Virginia), which embraced the territory now forming the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, making probably the largest county ever organized, exceeding the whole of Great Britain and Ireland; and thus the great orator of the American revolution, Patrick Henry, then governor of Virginia, became the first governor of Illinois. - Chicago News.





