
VOLUNTEER AND THISTLE

CITE IN YACHTING CIRCLES.

What a Scotch Yachtsman Thinks About the Matter-The Thistle Not Built After American Models.

cussion over the comparative merits of two yachts as the debates now going on in New York and other yachting centers over the merits of the Thistle and the Volunteer. The performance of the Thistle in the trial race which took place recently between the Volunteer and the Mayflower, and which effectually decided the superiority of the Volunteer, has called forth opinions of every shade. There can be no question that Volunteer stock has gone up considerably since the trial race, but the fact that on that occasion the Boston boat beat the Thistle should not furnish any reasonable grounds for supposing that the Volunteer is the better boat, but at the same time the fact that the Volunteer did beat the Thistle, no matter what the circumstances were, seems to have greatly stimulated confidence in the former boat. To sum up the whole matter, the facts seem to be as fol-


On the day of the trial races the Volunteer beat the Thistle one minute and fiftynine seconds in a nine mile race. On that day the Volunteer was in racing trim and carried the same sail measurement that



COURSE OF VOLUNTEER IN TRIAL RACES. she will carry on the day of the great race, with the exception of her new mainsail, which is a trifle lighter and larger than her old one. It is safe to predict that she will not greatly exceed her performance of that day when she sails against the Thistle. The friends of the Thistle declare, in excusing her work, that she was not in racing trim. Her bottom was not clean, she towed a dingy astern and she carried two more boats in her davits. In addition to this, the Thistle carried a smaller jib than she usually does in such weather, and a man who was on board of her at the time asserts that she was hindered very much by the boats that hung in her davits.

A gentleman, who is yachting editor of a prominent Scotch journal, writes to The New York World a lengthy letter in which he says that in his twenty years' yachting experience he has never seen any vessel burst so much broken water as the Volunteer did on the day of the trial race. He even goes so far as to say that the Anchor line steamship in which he crossed the Atlantic did not make such a row even in a gale of wind. This seems to be putting the case rather strongly in view of the fact that the clean wake of the Volunteer has been expatiated on ever since she has been launched. He declares furthermore that the Thistle is no American invention, but is the outcome of the latest revision of the British yacht racing rule of measurement. Mr. Watson, the designer, has, he says, designed a new type of British yacht, and by fortunate guesswork has hit off a fast boat. The interesting fact remains, however, that the Thistle closely resembles American models.

The second race-Sept. 29-will be sailed either from Buoy 5, the Scotland lightship, or the Sandy Hook lightship, according to the wind on the day of the race. The third race, if it is necessary, will be sailed over a triangular course outside of Sandy Hook.







