Two weeks ago the schr. Oliver Mowat (Capt. Saunders) cleared for Cleveland. When a short distance from Charlotte she ran aground during a heavy fog and was considerably strained before being released. The accident would not have occurred for Capt. Saunders is a good mariner and knows the lakes well if a large sailor's needle had not got into the compass in some way. Afher arrival there that some water had got into her hold. She was loaded with coal for Swift, and on Sunday started for Kingston. She caught the big blow which proved disasrous to many vessels on Lake Erie between Ashtabula and Cleveland on Monday morning at 1 o'clock. Members of the crew say that it was the worst they ever experienced. In a short time the deck of the Mowat was filled with water and the pumps had to be work them, and had no time to look after the canvas. The crew expected every moment to see the boat dismastand masts and rigging and sails carried away by the wind. They labored at the pumps for twenty hours, and at the end of that time there were nineteen inches of water in the hold. The mate states that the steambarge Blanchard which passed down yesterday to Ogdensburg with grain narrowly escaped foundering off Long Point, Lake Erie, during the blow.

CHANGES IN THE CABINET.

This May Occur Before the Next Session of the House of Commons.

London, Oct. 7. - There is good reason to believe that some changes of importance are impending in the ministry, none of which, however, will affect the main lines of its Irish policy.

Among the probable changes are the following: Lord Cross may retire from the India office, Lord Stanley from the board of trade, Lord Manners from the Duchy of Lancaster, Mr. Smith from the leadership of the house of commons. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach may be able to resume his place in the ministry next session. In that case Mr. Balfour will give up Ireland. The most important speculative change is much discussed privately. Namely, that Lord Salisbury will give up one of his two offices and remain prime minister, Mr. Goschen to go to the foreign office and Lord Churchill to

return as chancellor of the exchequer. Mr. Gladstone is keeping quiet, but plan! ning great coups. The fight slackens and enthusiasm declines whenever he is off the stage. An ominous fact for his allies is that the dissentient liberals seem discouraged.

A MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR.

A Tanner Found Dead at Brockville-And he Was a Man of Good Position.

BROCKVILLE, Oct. 7.-Yesterday J. D. Raymond, tanner, was discovered dead. Coroner Vaux was notified, but from the appearance of the corpse decided that an inquest was unnecessary, and appearances pointed strongly to apoplexy as the cause of death. When the undertakers began their work with the corpse a bullet hole was found in his side. The coroner was immediately notified and a search was instituted for the revolver. It was found some fifteen feet from where the body was found. As deceased was a man of cheerful disposition the idea of suicide is discredited by all who knew him, and as there was no trace what ever of foul play it is thought that he accidentally shot himself, the bullet taking effect in his right side, passing through the liver. The deceased was formerly a resident of Ogdensburg. He was a man of education, sober and industricus, and at one time held the position of United States consul in

GENERAL BULLER'S SUCCESSOR.

Sir Joseph West Ridgeway Has Assumed the Under Secretaryship for Ireland.

London, Oct. 6 .- The final departure of General Sir Redvers Buller, from the office of permanent under secretary for Ireland and the induction into office of his successor Col. Sir Joseph West Ridgeway, severs the last official link between the tory govern ment and the people of Ireland and the former's policy of force in ruling the Emerald isle will henceforth meet with no hindrance from within the precincts of Dublin castle. Refreshments were served and enjoyed; afterwards some time was spent in hearing addresses and in receiving voluntary offerings for the purpose of wiping out the small debt on the hall. Over \$100 were raised and a number of promises made to render substantial assistance at a later date. Rev. Hugh Pedley, of Cobourg, who goes as a missionary to British Columbia, made an address on "Help," followed by Rev. Mr. Willett, of Cowansville, who goes because of ill-health to Southern California. T. J. Shanks, of the New York Witness, also spoke briefly. The congregation also took farewell of Thomas Hendry, who returns to California shortly, and who, during his holidays here tendered efficient service, especially by inciting to noble action the young people of the church. His closing words of admonition to young men were very impressive. During the evening hearty singing was indulged in, led by the members of the choir.

MR. O'BRIEN'S CHARGES.

He Reiterates His Very Serious Accusations Against Solicitor-General Gibson.

London, Oct. 6.-Mr. William O'Brien reiterates his accusation that Solicitor General Gibson sent, on the day of Mr. O'Brien's conviction, a telegram to the crown counsel saying that the government would lose their case and that Mr. Harrington, Mr. O'Brien's counsel, would be disbarred. Despite the denials of the solicitor-general and the crown counsel, that such a message passed between them, Mr. O'Brien alleges that the despatch was sent in cipher, and challenges the accused officials to bring an action for libel against him, intimating that they dare not do so lest the facts should be exposed. In support of his charge Mr. O'Brien says that the present case is by no means the first of its kind that has occurred, the former attorney-general, now Justice Holmes, having exhibited his duplicity in a precisely similar case not long before it was decided to reward him for his questionable services to the crown by raising him to the

RUSSIANS HAVE A CARE.

An Italian Authority Speaks-Czar Lad Better Be Watchful Of Himself.

ROME, Oct. 7.—The Reforma says Russia's proposals with reference to Bulgaria may serve as a basis for proposals with reference to discussion, but it is impossible to permit of the appointment of a Russian envoy in violation of the Berlin treaty. Russia ought, henceforth, to recognize how prejudicial to her is her policy of separating herself on most important European ques tions from the powers, which from their number and unity are always in a position to utter a precisive word. The Reforma repeats that the Bismarck and Crispi interview means peace.
