WHAT THE PAPERS SAY

Mrs. Cleveland has received the fleeces of two merino lambs descended from her Grandfather Poison's flock; has bought a pair of curds, and under her mother's directions has been carding and spinning the wool, with the ultimate purpose of knitting some winter stockings for the president.

Hugh Whittella, who died a few days ago at Alameda, Cal., at the age of 77 years, erected his own monument some years ago. It is a splendid marble shaft, bearing his name and the dates of his birth and death, and this epitaph: "He traveled over the first railway ever built in England, and crossed the Atlantic in the first steamship that ever plowed the ocean. He explored many lands, and died in the fullness of the faith. Amen."

George Alfred Townsend, when in Scotland recently, visited the estate of the Duke of Buccleuch, at Dalkeith. The Duke of Buccleuch is considered the richest man in Scotland. In spite of this fact, however, he is sometimes hard up for money. He has an income of about \$1,500,000 a year, but has five establishments to keep up and so many poor relations, retainers, pensioners, etc., that this enormous amount of money quickly disappears under the great sponging process.

The Prince of Wales when he took his morning draughts at the Homburg springs gazed at beholders with an amazing costume. It was made apparently out of a snuff colored blanket, delicately set off by a red silk handkerchief tied round his neck so as to show above the collar a "thin red line." This striking costume was based on tan leather shoes and crowned by a light gray felt Tyrolean hat. A white Pomeranian dog followed at his heels. His invariable salutation to his feminine acquaintances was, "Are you drinking the watais this morning?"

Information comes from Ellerton that Col. Fred Grant, who is still at his mother's cottage there, is engaged in preparing an edition de luxe of his father's memoirs. The work will be in two volumes, handsomely printed on fine paper. In each volume there will be printed two or three pages of the original manuscript as it left Gen. Grant's hand. The edition is to be limited to 1,000 copies, to be sold at \$100 each. The sale, of course, will be by subscription only, and the contemplated number has already been largely taken up. The profits on the venture are quite sure to reach \$75,000. Mrs. Grant has already received something over \$50,000 from the sale of the memoirs as they were first issued, so that Gen. Grant's intense wish to provide for the future of his family by the work of his pen has been splendidly realized. Mrs. Grant has now at least \$500,000 and, as she entertains very little and goes into society hardly at all, her fortune is constantly growing. She has been passing a serene summer at Ellerton and is looking extremely well.

Herbert Gladstone, the son of the ex-premier, is a member of Parliament. He looks very much more like his mother than his father. He is of medium height, with straight, well molded figure. He has a good head, a clear, clean, expressive countenance and a gentle manner, indicative of a modest and retiring temperament. His complexion is very clear and ruddy, his features delicate and regular; his hair is a light and sandy brown, his eyes are dark and his mustache and slight side whiskers ornament his fresh colored face. He appears to be in the neighborhood of 40 years of age. He wore at a recent outdoor entertainment a light gray suit and white waistcoat and a high white hat. His sister, who stood upon the right of Mr. Gladstone during his famous speech on the occasion of the presentation of the American testimonial, is taller even than her father. She is a blonde, with luxurious, clear combed hair twisted high upon her gracefully shaped head. Her eyes are blue, her complexion a dainty pink and white; her nose is a delicate rostrous; her mouth is small, with a most pleasant expression. She wore a summer dress, the yellow lace work revealing the shape of her shoulders and the rounded lines of her arms. She was the most attentive listener in the group. She felt every word of her father's address and paid the same unflinching attention to the speech of presentation.

Owner of Tortugas Island.

Commander Ullmann, a retired officer of the Hungarian army, who is now traveling in this country, is the owner of the Tortugas island, about which the Haytian and British governments had quite a controversy some time ago. Tortugas island is considered valuable for a naval station, as it has the best advantages for the large ships of war and several natural harbors. Great Britain, it was said, wanted the island for this purpose, and the United States were also interested in it for this reason. The British government threatened to seize the island on account of a claim of \$1,000,000, but this was settled by the payment of \$100,000. The Haytian government owned the island, and was in need of funds. When they were pressed for the claim they speedily raised the money in Paris, and the next thing we hear is that the island was purchased by Commander Ullmann. He regards his purchase as a valuable one, as it commands an easy mode of travel to the Panama canal. The new owner of the island is anxious for the United States to assume the dominion of the island. He has offered the island to this government on very easy terms. The island is very fertile, and has on it large tracts of timber land. It will be a valuable purchase if the United States government buys it.—Demorest's Monthly.

The Winans Stone Wall.

Around the grounds of the Winans mansion in Baltimore is a high stone wall, and it is said that this wall was erected by Mr. Winans because, many years ago, when the garden was first built, he filled it with statues copied from the antique, and opened it to the public. The nude in art was not regarded with as liberal and artistic an eye in those days as it is today, and the people of Baltimore applied to the city council to have the statues removed. The council, of course, paid no attention to this petition, but Mr. Winans was so enraged by it that he surrounded his garden with a wall so high that no one could see over it.—Home Journal.

Oberammergau's Passion Play.

The Passion play at Oberammergau will not be performed again till 1890, but during the last month the villagers have been giving a series of dramatic representations in their theatre of Muller's drama, "Emperor Otto the Great and His House," in which the role of the emperor was taken by the wood carver Mayer, who takes the part of Christ in the Passion play. The costumes and scenery, all of which were much admired by the prince regent of Bavaria, who recently drove over from his hunting lodge in the vicinity and was present at the performance, were made and painted in the village.—Home Journal.
