FOUND A MARE'S NEST.

The Belleville Outario has made a discovery-that "it is the people of Kingston, who never gave a railway bonus, who are endeavouring to cajole the tax-burdened residents

of Hungerford into giving a bonus for the extension of the N. T. & Q. railway from of Kingston are naturally enough much interested in any scheme which has for its object the prosperity of the city, but in this matter the people of Hungerford are infinitely more interested, and are promising a liberal bonus to the road, and an amount of traffic which the N. T. & Q. railway company must appreciate. The deep displeasure of the Ontario is quite apparent. Hungerford is in Hastings county and the idea of it desiring a business connection with Kingston instead of Belleville is not pleasant to contemplate. The fact is, however, that the Hungerford people, as expressed in correspondence, prefer Kingston, and it would be an extraordinary circumstance if the local council or board of trade worked with the end to their defeat. In regard to bonuses Kingston is more fortunate than Belleville. Its gift to the Kingston & Pembroke railway has been more than repaid, and it is because of this experience that the friends of the N. T. & Q. railway are prepared to advocate the granting of a liberal bonus to it. By death, resulting from a stroke of paralysis, one of the most remarkable men in the political life of Canada has been removed. We refer to the late Senator Senecal, whose end, painfully watched, came on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Senecal was French by birth, and had been for years a prominent figure, made so by the exercise of his own commanding ability. He built several railways in the province of Quebec, bought and sold others, then acquired a controlling interest in the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation company, and by extending the scope of its influence merited the title of "uncrowned king of the St. Lawrence." He was a member of both the dominion and provincial parliaments, of the one from 1867 to 1871, and of the other from 1867 to 1872, but outside of the house he had much more influence than in it and gloried in helping to make parliament rather than in the work of any house.

The Montreal Herald, in its review of his life, refers to the fact that Mr. Senecal, in the earlier stages of his political career, was a liberal, and gave his party efficient aid. Later, however, he was introduced by Mr. Dansereau to Mr. Chapa leau, then in power in Quebec, and an alliance was entered into between these gentlemen that continued down to Mr. Senecal's death. Mr. Chapleau found him a most valuable ally, especially during general and bye-elections, when Mr. Senecal, as he stated under oath, spent money freely in a large number of constituencies to keep Mr. Chapleau and his friends in office. He was a broad-minded, far-sighted business man and politician, who seldom hesitated about the means to be employed to accomplish his ends. He understood the people of the province thoroughly, and knew where and how to operate to reach the political or party results he had in view. He has not left his superior in the province in political strategy and finesse.

His courage, his energy, his foresight and sagacity are generally lauded, but the bent of them, politically, is not generally commended. According to the philosophy of some men the method of accomplishing an object is not to be considered, only the object attained. If method is of no account and only results are to be taken into reckoning Mr. Senecal was one of the greatest men that Canada ever produced. As a strategist he was without a peer, for the reason that his strategy was of a kind which few men preferred to practice.

CLANNISHNESS OF RACE.

Our telegraph column reports a case in which the clannishness of race has seriously interfered with the administration of justices Some time since a man, French in nationality, educated, and an aspirant for religious orders, was accused of a serious offence, that of criminally assaulting a poor young woman. It was hoped for his own sake, and for the sake of his associations, that he would succeed in establishing his innocence or in offering some evidence in mitigation of his conduct. His crime was, however, not only proven but esteemed worthy of severe punishment, and he was sentenced to two years' imprisonment lacking a month and flogging with the cat, the stripes to be applied at stated periods covering the time of his incarceration. To-day it seems he received the first whipping, and the telegram

says it was the greatest farce imaginable. Who made it such? The gaol officials. Why? Because of the indisposition of one Frenchman to wound another as the process of law had been applied at the instigation of the English and been facilitated by English influence. Surely this is not an evidence of the harmony existing between the races in Montreal. On the contrary it is the proof of that mischief which the politicians have encouraged in their bids for political power. It was only the other day that six French . men on a jury refused to convict a country. man of an offence of which he was clearly guilty, simply because counsel had appealed to their prejudices and calculated for success upon the use of them rather than of their common sense and conscientious judg. ment. To be sure the obligation accepted by every juryman was ignored, but men are taught to blind themselves to the right so long as they perform what is scandalously termed a national service. It's a deplorable condition of things, and it must be viewed with feelings of alarm. The administration of justice must not, be interfered with on any account. It must not be understood by any one that he can break the law with impunity, and he could do so if justice could be defeated as easily generally as it Tamworth to Tweed." Indeed!
