

RAILWAY ENTERPRISE.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 14.-Mr. Depew president of the New York Central railway, says that the crazy and senseless speculation in real estate, and the building of thousands of miles of railway throughout the west which are not needed, will surely revolt in a financial panic. He -says the real estate craze, and the craze to build railways where there is nothing for them to haul, have been the direct cause of more financial disasters in this country than all else put together. However, the coming trouble will be discounted before it arrives, otherwise no enterprise could survive the shock. Nearly all the older and stronger business establishments of the country are becoming more and more conservative, and because they are the country will have safe and substantial rallying points, and hence the greatest damage will fall upon those who have invested their all wholly in prospective real estate equities, and worthless railway securities, but the shock will be felt more or less sensibly in all business plants.

Late Dr. Henry Howard.

Announcement is made of the death of Dr. Henry Howard, Montreal. He was born in Nenagh, Tipperary, in 1815, and studied medicine in Dublin and took his degree in London, Eng., 1838. He emigrated to Canada in 1842, and first resided on Amherst Island, near Kingston, and also in Kingston, going to Montreal in 1845. He was appointed medical superintendent of provincial lunatic asylums in 1861, and visiting physician of Longue Pointe asylum in 1875. He was also an ex-president of the Medico-Chirurgical society of Montreal. The deceased gentleman leaves two sons and three daughters.

MOB RULE IN LONDON.

A Serious Collision With The Police-And The Effects Of It.

LONDON, Oct. 14 .- The unemployed persons who frequent Trafalgar square formed in a body to day and marched to the Man-sion House, where they demanded an interview with the lord mayor. He declined to hold any conversation with the mob or its representatives. The crowd insisted upon an interview, but were again refused. They then denounced the lord mayor, after which they started back to Trafalgar square. They stopped at the office of the Standard and hooted and jeered. The police attempted to move the crowd, but were met with resistance. They then charged the mob and seized a black banner and a number of red flags. The mob then scattered, but shortly afterwards rallied. The leader of the crowd shouted, "Men assert your rights," and the mob rushed upon the police and succeeded in forcing them back from their position and in recapturing the black banner. The police soon rallied, however, and again charged the mob, who became demoralized and ran in every direction.
