THE CURIOSITY SHOP.

Deep Sea Fishes—Great Depths at Which Life Exists.

Fishes are not very common in deep water, and until lately it was thought there were none, chiefly because of the immense pressure being one ton per square inch for every 1,000 fathoms. As sunlight falls about 200 fathoms down, vegetable life also ceases, and as a consequence deep sea fishes are carnivorous. The most voracious often eat their own offspring, while others are nourished by animalcules, which, like a constant rain, settle down from the higher waters. Some are blind, some have ordinary eyes, others have phosphorescent protuberances to furnish them with light. Sir C. Wyville Thompson of the Challenger says that "animals of all the marine invertebrate classes, and probably fishes also, exist all over the floor of the ocean." So far the greatest depth reached by a dredge in which fish were included is 2,900 fathoms; but the specimen thus obtained belongs to a species which seems to be abundant in upper strata of the Atlantic and Pacific, and was therefore most likely caught by the dredge in its ascent. The next greatest depth, viz., 2,750 fathoms, must be accepted as one at which fishes undoubtedly do live, the fish obtained at this depth of the Atlantic showing by its whole habit that it is a form living on the bottom.

Monuments and Spires.

The Washington monument at the national capital is the tallest structure in existence that has been raised by human hands, being 555 feet. The top of the capstan is eight feet higher than the crest of the pyramid of Cheops, which, prior to the completion of this lofty memorial to the "Father of his country," claimed precedence in height over everything that man has raised. The other most lofty structures are: Antwerp cathedral, 476 feet; Strasburg cathedral, 474; tower of Utrecht, Holland, 464; St. Stephen's steeple, Vienna, 460; St. Martin's church, Bavaria, 456; pyramid of Cephane's, Egypt, 456; St. Peter's, Rome, 448; Salisbury spire, England, 410; St. Paul's, London, 404; St. Peter's, at Hambro', 395; cathedral at Florence, 384; Cremona cathedral, 372; Seville cathedral, 360; pyramid of Sakkarah, Egypt, 356; Notre Dame cathedral, Munich, 348; dome of the Invalides, Paris, 347; Magdeburg cathedral, 337; St. Mark's, Venice, 328; Assinelli tower, Bologna, 314; Trinity church, New York, 283; column at Delhi, India, 262; Porcelain tower, China, 242; Canterbury tower, 235; Notre Dame, Paris, 232; Dunker Hill monument, 230.

The Second Law of Motion.

If there be two or more causes of motion taking place in two different right lines, whether inherent in the body or external to it, these effects do not interfere nor does either diminish or augment the effect of the other. In other words, when a force acts upon a body in motion, the change of motion which it produces is in the direction and proportioned to the magnitude of the force which acts. Those who move on a railroad at the rate of thirty miles an hour or forty-five feet in a second, do not find the relation in which they stand to the objects in the carriage in any degree changed by the velocity. The stone or ball, like the passengers, has a common motion onward with and derived from the train, and when let fall from the hand it retains that motion during its descent. At the commencement of its fall it would have the speed of the train in a horizontal direction and gravity would act upon it in a vertical direction and it would fall as though the car was without motion.

Visible Stars.

Stars of the first six magnitudes are visible to the naked eye on clear, moonless nights. The number visible at any one time would vary with the position of the heavens (or more correctly, of the earth). The number of stars of the first six magnitudes between the north pole and 35 degs. south of the equator, which includes all which culminate at greater altitude than 15 degs. for the middle states, is as follows: First magnitude, 14; second, 48; third, 152; fourth, 318; fifth, 834; sixth, 2,010; total, 3,391. Heis, who gives these figures, says, however, that there are 1,964 more which he can see with his naked eye. We might say that perhaps about two-thirds of the above number (6,391) would, on the average, be visible at any one time.

The Golden Rule.

Do unto others as you would be done by. This sentiment Christ uttered in his sermon on the mount, when he said: "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." (Matt. vii, 12) It was not original with him, however, but was essentially common property among all ancient races. Confucius said, 500 B. C.: "Do not to another which you desire not him to do to you." and Hillel, fifty years before Jesus, said: "The whole law is, do as you would be done by."

The Names of Days.

Sunday is so called because this day was anciently dedicated to the sun or its worship. Monday signifies day of the moon or day sacred to the moon. Tuesday from Tiewes, the Mars of our ancestors, the god of war, and dag, a day. Wednesday from Weida, the highest god of the Germans and Scandinavians, and dag, a day. Thursday from Thur, the god of thunder, and dag, a day. Friday from Fria, the goddess of marriage, and dag, a day. Saturday from Saturn and dag, a day.

Buried Cities.

The cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum were overwhelmed by an eruption of Vesuvius, accompanied by an earthquake, Aug. 23 and 24, A. D. 79. At the time the principal citizens were assembled at a theatre, where public spectacles were exhibited. The whole city and surrounding country were buried by the ashes. For fifteen centuries the place was lost entirely, after which time the mere accidental upturning of a vase led to its re-discovery.

Early Shavers.

The earliest reference to shaving is found in Genesis xii, 14, where we read that Joseph, on being summoned before the king, shaved himself. So shaving must have been a custom long enough before that occasion. There are several directions as to shaving in Leviticus, and the practice is alluded to in many other parts of Scripture. The Romans never wore beards.

The Waters of Lethe.

In the mythology of the Greeks Lethe's pool is the stream of forgetfulness, from which souls drink before passing into the Elysian Fields, that they may forget all earthly sorrows.

Built His Own Tomb.

The first burial in St. Paul's cathedral was that of its builder, Sir Christopher Wren. He was buried in the extreme east of crypt. The earliest statue erected was that of Howard, the philanthropist.

Masterpiece of Sculpture.

The most beautiful piece of statuary in existence is doubtless the Apollo Belvidere. It was found in a temple at Antium and for 300 years has stood in the belvedere of the Vatican, Rome.
