THE CHEESE MARKET.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—The cheese market continued dull and inactive, with no animation in any quarter. The cable remained at 58s. A private letter written by an exporter to a Liverpool correspondent describes the situation as follows: 'The present cheese situation is not encouraging to those who have loaded up August, September and October make at 12s. and more around Brockville and Belleville. There are 70,000 boxes still unsold between here and Belleville. I can buy finest September and October at 11s. in Montreal. At Ingersoll, Listowel, Woodstock and Stratford nothing has been done for weeks, but factorymen there are still holding, yet cheese can be bought there at 11s. Unless cheese improves very much our friends may make up their minds to drop anywhere from a dollar a box upward, which will make a hole in any previous profit. Any amount of repudiation and consequently squealing going on.'

KNIGHTS OF LABOR.

They Are Having a Rather Lively Time of It Now in Minneapolis.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 16.—Since the knights of labor convention opened Messrs. Barry and Bailey have advocated every motion presented by the "antis." He took issue against the administration on the anarchist question and made a sensational speech. He also advocated the side of the "antis" in the fight over the Chicago stock yards strike. In each case the "antis" were defeated. Barry and Bailey have indeed known that a fight was to be made to get rid of them and made preparations for it.

The local assembly spent some time in a red hot discussion over the resolution changing the manner of approving the executive board, which was providing a way to get rid of Barry and Bailey. Powderly denies that he has written a letter of resignation, but this is discredited.

SHAMOKIN, Pa., Oct. 10.—The knights of labor convention to-day was attended by 300 delegates. The convention passed a resolution condemning the action of coal operators in their treatment of miners. The members contributed liberally themselves and called upon the national assembly to furnish \$20,000 for the support of the strikers, and asked the citizens of Lehigh region to withdraw their support from the Lehigh Valley railroad until the matter has been amicably settled.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—The action of the general assembly of the knights of labor in sustaining Powderly has given impetus to the movement in district assembly No. 57 (stock yards) to go out of the order altogether. The barrel-makers' assembly knights of labor may also succeed.

SIR CHARLES AND TEMPERANCE.

He Has Denied the Statement That He Shirked the Prohibition Vote.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 17.—In reply to the statement that he shirked the vote on the prohibition issue in the last session of parliament, Sir Charles Tupper writes a letter to the Herald, in which he says: 'I had previously stated to Sir John A. Macdonald and to my colleagues that I intended to vote with the friends of temperance and prohibition, and I regret extremely that I was prevented by severe indisposition from having an opportunity of recording my vote on that occasion. I regard the suppression of intemperance by every possible means as so vitally important that I had no hesitation in pledging myself to sustain whatever measures were introduced in parliament calculated to attain that end, and I do not hesitate to say that if returned as a representative of Cumberland the friends of temperance and prohibition may confidently rely upon all the aid I am able to give them in carrying out their principles. I may add that should the time come when I am unable to support in parliament the wishes of the friends of temperance I will resign my seat and give them an opportunity of electing my successor. William Johnson, M.P., writes to the Belfast Telegraph: 'The Orangemen of the British Empire are greatly indebted to Bro. W. Shannon, of Kingston, Ont. It was he who suggested to me the idea of the Triennial Orange council, which has for twenty years worked so successfully, and brought together the leading Orangemen of Great Britain. Since 1860, when the Orangemen of Kingston refused to submit to have their institution ignored, on the occasion of the visit to Canada of the Prince of Wales, Bro. Shannon has kept me constantly informed concerning Canadian Orangism.'

"The Messiah."

A scheme for organizing a chorus for the performance of Handel's great oratorio, "The Messiah," under the direction of Mr. F. W. Wodell, is now being talked of in this city. It is said to be the intention to make the "Messiah" chorus as large as possible, and to invite Kingston vocalists generally to join it. The oratorio was successfully performed in Hamilton, under Mr. Wodell's direction, in 1886. Mr. Wodell was conductor of the Arion Club, soloist of the Philharmonic Society, and of Centenary church, Hamilton, and several works for chorus, and chorus and orchestra have been performed there under his direction.

Robbing a Grave.

Parties from Lansdowne were in the city to-day looking for a body that had been stolen from their graveyard. The medical colleges in the city were searched. A body, that of the late W. Moleley, interred a few days ago at Lansdowne, has been stolen. It is suspected that it is in Kingston, and the ground for such suspicion is that some students at the medical college belong to Lansdowne.

On Thursday evening at 7:45 the Rev. Dr. Morrison, of Ogdensburg, will preach at the harvest thanksgiving service in St. Paul's church. After service is over the ladies are to tender a complimentary social to the members of the synod, both clerical and lay. KEEPING OF THE SABBATH.

A Belleville Man Takes a Hand in the Controversy—What He Contends.

BELLEVILLE, Oct. 14.—(To the Editor): In your yesterday's issue a letter appears from Mr. Broom, in which he tries to promulgate the idea that the Jewish Sabbath is binding on the Gentiles. I for one deny that the Gentile nations were ever, in any dispensation, commanded by God to keep holy the seventh day of the week. God did not command any of mankind to keep the Sabbath day for over 2,000 years after the creation of man. The creator, at the exodus, gave the Sabbath to the Israelites, but none of the Gentiles were commanded to observe it, excepting "the stranger that is within thy gates." Gentiles living with the Jews were required to be subject to their laws, just as we require foreigners to be subject to our laws. The words "within thy gates" show that the command to keep the Sabbath holy did not apply to those nations outside the Jewish commonwealth; the language shows a limited application. I think a person would be quite safe in offering Mr. Broom \$100 or more for the production of one passage of scripture going to show that Gentiles are required to keep the seventh day, or any other day, holy in the strict order in which the Jews were commanded to observe the Sabbath. God, at creation, "blessed the seventh day and sanctified it; because that in it He had rested from all his work," but He did not then ask man to observe the day or keep it holy.—A. ROBINSON.
