#### SCIENCE AND PROGRESS.

HOW CRABS CAST OFF A LIMB WHEN IRRITATED OR INJURED.

Restrictions on the Practice of Medicine in Minnesota-How to Discover Trichina in Pork-A Plan Devised for Adjusting the Zero of Thermometers.

Thermometers are known to alter with time, and Mr. Andrew Haddon has devised the plan for adjusting their zero, which is illustrated in the figure. In this apparatus

the thermometer tube is fastened at one end to a sepapiece which slide in the scale, so as to enable any one to adjust his instrument so as to agree with a standard thermometer, or with any other in his possession. The figure shows one of Mr. Haddon's in-

struments fitted in its protective case,

Practice of Medicine in Minnesota. Under a law recently passed in the Minnesota legislature the restrictions placed upon the practice of medicine in that state will be more severe than in any other part of the United States. All persons who wish to practice medicine must pass an examination before a board of nine persons, irrespective of whether they hold regular diplomas or not, and only those who have taken three courses of medical lectures will be permitted to the

examination.

Making l'aper Adhere to Metal. The following formula for a mixture which can be used for metal, glass or wood, is given in Revue Photographique: Gum tragacanth, 30 grammes; acacia gum, 120 grammes; water, 500 c. c. Dissolve, fliter, and add 21/4 grammes of thymol suspended in 120 c. c. of glycerine; then add enough water to make up the bulk to I liter. This bath will keep a long time.

Tracing Trichinge in Pork. The best mode of tracing or finding trichinæ in pork by means of a microscope, says Scientific American, is as follows: Cut a very thin longitudinal slice of the muscle by means of a very sharp knife or razor. Press it bet two glass slips, and examine by transm . I light. The coiled triching may be distinguished from the muscle fiber.

Las, Way to Repair a Boiler Furnace. When you have to repair your boiler furnace, says The Stationary Engineer, and cannot get any fire clay, take common earth mixed with water, in which you have dissolved a little rock or other salt; use same as fine clay; the furnace will last fully as long.

#### To Write on Glass.

An ink that will write on glass can be made from ammonium fluoride dissolved in water and mixed with three times its weight of barium sulphate.

#### Self Mutilation of Animals.

An article in a recent number of La Nature discusses at length the power possessed by crabs and some other animals of casting off a limb when roughly injured or irritated. This description is accompanied by an illustration which we reproduce, showing how this act, for which the name "autotomy" is suggested, may be of use in allowing the animal to escape from its enemies.

M. Parize tried the experiment of placing a common crab near a large octopus, which is found upon the coasts of Brittany and lives largely upon these crustacea. The octopus seized the crab by a claw with one of his tentacles, but as soon as the crab felt the pressure he quietly abandoned the unfortunatc member and hurried away to a safer locality, and, if crabs have any sense of humor, doubtless laughing at the disappointment of the octope; who was defrauded of his dinner in such an unfair manner. Fortunately the crab suffers lucla inconvenience from his self mutilation. In a short time a new limb is reproduced, fully equal to the c'-1 one, and ready to be abandoned in its turn if occasion requires. Lobsters and some other crustacea possess the same faculty, both of self dismemberment and reproduction of lost limbs. Certain spiders, on the contrary, although they can cast off their legs if necessarv, never recover them, but remain partially crippled for the remainder of their



M. Parize considers that autotomy is largely a voluntary act and that the animal deliberately sacrifices his limb to escape from his enemy, agreeing upon this point with Professor Huxley; but M. Fredericq, on the contrary, thinks that it is a reflex phenomenon, caused by the irritation of the limb, just as we instinctively close our eyes when a grain of sand is blown into them or start at a sudden noise.

#### Advice to Travelers.

Those who wish to make themselves as comfortable as possible while traveling in a sleeper will do well to note the following advice from Medical and Surgical Record: For men a light cap, one that will cover over the ears, so as to serve as a nightcap, will be desirable. In cold weather a woolen cap is best. This cap should be put on as soon as the car is entered. A loose blouse should take the place of the coat usually worn. Slippers must not be worn. If there is a draught in the car, face it, do not let it strike the back. Have the bed made with its head toward the engine; the dust will then be driven to the foot, where it will do the least harm. But be sure to have a sufficient quantity of bedclothes to keep warm. A soft, loose knit woolen hood is the best headwear for women; this should be worn at night also. It should be warmer in winter than in summer months. The corsets should be removed at night and a loose woolen wrapper worn for a nightdress. The stocking supporters, as well as every constricting band around the waist, should be loosened.

#### PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

Ill Health of American Women-Effect of Arsenic on the Blood and Skin.

· The ill health that prevails to so great an extent among American women has grown to be a subject of much consideration. Virginia Penny enumerates various causes for the weakness and early breaking down of her country women, who, in this respect, compare ill with English women. Much of the insanity among her sex she attributes to the lack of out door exercise in childhood and precocious development of mind. American girls have a fairer, fresher appearance from 16 to 18 years of age than foreigners, but they fade earlier. The loss of health and dejection of spirits among the middle and higher classes of society are mostly from the want of regular occupation; some definite aim, some high and elevating pursuit.

The health of women that work in the fields is generally excellent because of their exercise in pure air. According to Miss Penny, moderate exercise in the open air will give vigor and freedom to both mind and

The early entrance into society of most American ladies has its bad effect. The unsettled state of mind it engenders, the intense love of excitement, are certainly disadvantageous.

American women, according to our authority, marry too early and live too secluded. Many are scarcely out of school before they settle down as wives and housekeepers, the cares of a family devolving on them before they have the strength and nerve to perform them. Most women do not know enough of the laws of health. The majority of married women, with families of small children, need more relaxation and greater variety of recreation. Many become so chained down in body and mind by household cares and labors that health and spirits sink beneath the load and they grow prematurely old. Some housewives suffer from bad servants; some perform drudgery for which they are unfit. The indoor labor performed by American women is prodigious. What affects the body influences the mind. When one is worn the other is irritated. English women have more and better servants. English women walk and ride more, marry later and have better constitutions by nature.

This powder is invaluable for healing raw and irritated surfaces, and for curing sunburn. Mixed in the proportion of three parts of vasetine or cold-cream, it forms a most useful domestic remedy in the way of a general healing salve.

#### Miller's Cough.

This distressing complaint is caused by the constant inhalation of dust laden air in a flouring mill. In case of lungs naturally weak it runs at last into the ordinary symptoms of pulmonary complaint. When due only to the dusty atmosphere of the mill, a change to pure air is usually an effectual remedy. A practical miller affected with miller's cough has been obliged to quit the business. He finds that, while perfectly well so long as he keeps away from the mill, a return for a few hours' time will start his cougiafresh, and medicines are of no avail. Pure air alone is, in his opinion, the only cure for miller's asthma.

#### How to Administer Castor Oil.

Of all nauseating agents employed by physicians, castor oil stands near, if not at, the head of the list. It is not quite so bad when taken in strong coffee or lemon juice. In the form of an emulsion it is far less objectionable, according to The Boston Herald. To prepare it, beat up the dose to be administered with the white of an egg, and then add the juice of a lemon or a sufficient quantity of strong peppermint water; by this means the offensive taste is completely disguised.




