VIGILANTES AND OUTLAWS.

A Desperate Fight Occurs in Kansas-The

Loss by Killed and Wounded. LITTLE ROCK, Oct. 22.-The following were among the persons killed in Thursday's fight on North Fork river, between the outlaws and vigilantes: James Saunders, or Oaks, Cherokee nation ; Garfield, Cherokee nation, Red Rock; Chap, Lukfata, Bush Sakaisk, Patruyk chief, Paur Oaks; Samuel H. Elletter, Enfaula Walter, Ainsworth Ranger, Muskogee; Darling Price, a settler, Gamp Creek. John Luch, an outlaw, and five others are said to have been killed. The leader of the vigilantes was Robert brave half-breed from the Creek nation. The outlaws found shelter behind the trees, which line the banks of the river so that when the vigilantes came up they were entirely at the mercy of two score of men who knew not what mercy was. Henderson led his men a short distance up the river where they were as well protected as the outlaws. The river was only 100 yards wide there, and across this distance, from Thursday morning to Thursday night, bullets were singing on their mission of death. In obtaining this position the vigilantes lost two and five were badly wound. ed. Trainor, the outlaw leader, next-decided to attack the vigilantes in the rear, but in moving for the position they were met half way and routed. In endeavour to rally his men Bill Chene was killed, and before the men could be reached John Leech, of the robber gang, was shot off his horse but not killed. The fight from this on was continued across the stream. No sooner was a head, arm or any part of a body visible on either side than a bullet was seeking to find a lodgment therein. As Thursday night was coming on Henderson called his men in for consultation, when it was found that out of his force eight men were killed outright and eight others had received severe wounds. The force was thus reduced one-half and was thought' best to remove the wounded and obtain reinforcements. The dead were buried and the wounded taken to Wewoka. It is thought that as many of the outlaws were killed as the vigilantes. Henderson says he will collect 100 men and wipe the robbers out. It is believed that Bill Trainor was killed during the fight.

The prop. St. Magnus, with 33,000 bush. of wheat from Duluth, is in port. The schr. B. W. Folger has also arrived from Oswego with 202 tons of coal.

Capt. Donnelly says that the gale last night was very severe. The wind was from a westerly point of the compass and had any vessels been on the lake they would have been carried toward the south shore. He expects to hear of numerous accidents. The schr. Annie Falconer run across last night, but made Oswego safely, reaching there at midnight.


